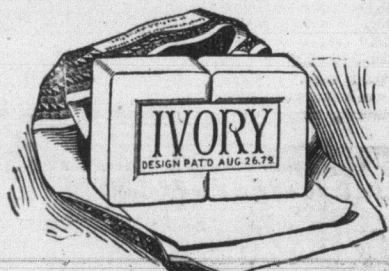

### PITRE VS. JOHNSON

Hockey Puck Travelled Faster than Pitched Base Ball

Fans who follow both hockey and baseball differ in regard to whether a puck can be shot faster than a baseball can be thrown. In other words, is Walter Johnson's fast ball faster than a shot from the stick of Didier Pitre? An authority on the subject has submitted an opinion. Harry Cheek, who used to catch for the Vancouver Beavers, and who saw Pitre shoot during a Stanley Cup series, made some efforts to time his shots. He had also seen Walter Johnson pitch, and while he had no figures on Walter Johnson's speed, and was unable to get anything like accurate figures on Pitre's bullet shooting, he declared that as far as he could judge he would rather, any day, stand up and catch a ball from Walter Johnson than take Harry Holmes' place in the net and catch a shot from the stick of Pitre.

He argued that Pitre's shot is the faster traveller, because, while you could see a ball pitched by Johnson, you couldn't see a shot from Pitre until it is right upon you. The argument that a puck should travel faster because the player has a lever in a hockey stick to give it the extra speed; while the pitcher has to throw with his fingers and has no lever, still appears to stand.

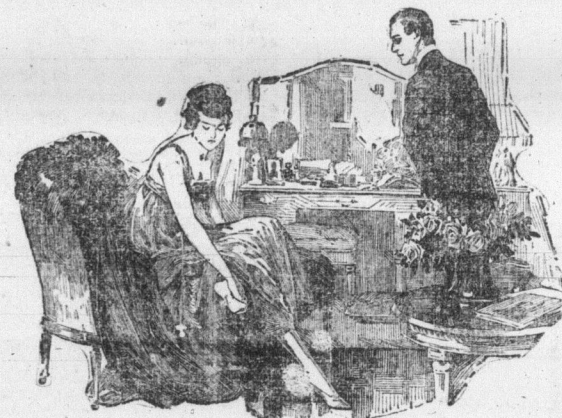
