A Hint for Voters.

La Semaine Religieuse publishes an extract from the appendix to the Ritual referring to the elections This extract reminds the voters that God will ask an account not only of what will have been said and done, but even of what will have been thought during the elections. What is forbidden in ordinary times is even more so during the elections, on account of the serious consequences that may follow. Voters must, then, be careful not to perjure themselves, and must abstain from all threats and acts of violence. Intemperance is always a degrading vice, but it must be avoided with still greater care in election times, for it is the cause of many disorders, and renders one unable to exercise his noble and important right of franchise with intelligence. Voters must not make slaves of themselves by selling their vote, and they must not accept a bribe elther to vote or to abstain from voting. After having formed their opinion on the basis of roligious and social principles they must give their vote in favor of the candidate who, in the sight of God, they have reason to believe to be truly honest and able to fulfil the duties of his mission. Candidates expounding their views will have been said and done, but even of what

must be listened to with all the attention due to such an important matter, and with the politioness and caim required by Christian charity. At the same time voters must be on their guard against false principles and bad advice, and if such are brought forward the bost way to protest is to leave the meeting. The last advice is to pray that all those who take part in the elections may not soil their soul with any criminal act.

Death of a Well Known Citizou.

In St. Patrick's Church, on Monday, a solemn Mass of Requiem was offered up by the Rev. J. A. McCallen for the repose of the soul of the late William Wilson, who died on Thursday last, at his residence on Palace street. Death was caused by injuries which he had received a few days previously through being knocked down by the shaft of a sleigh on St. James The funeral took place on Sunday, when the remaing were laid to rest in the Cote des Neiges cemetery. The news of his death caused deep regret amongst a large circle of friends and acquaintances, especially amongst the Irish Catholics of this city, by whom he was best known and estoemed. Mr. Wilson was in his seventy-fourth year, and was a native of Ennis, County Clare, Ireland. When a young man he served in the 24th British regiment, retiring about thirty years ago on a

He came to Montreal in 152, went into business, and after amassing a competency withdrew into private life. He always took a keen and practical interest in every movement having for its object the promotion of the welfare of his Irish co-religionists. CARDINAL MANNING.

The Archbishop's Organ on the Decease ed English Churchman

An article appeared in Saturday's issue of La Semane Religiouse on the late Cardinal Manning. "The greatest personality," it begins, "of the Catholic Church in England in the nine reenth century has just disappeared. His death does not come as a surprise when one considers that he was already affected by age and the fatigues of a life devoted to the services of the Catholic religion in the United Kingdom, and crowned, one may say, with the most enconraging and effective success." The article proceeds to enlogize the great attainments in the theological knowledge of the late Cardinal. his skill in controversy, the part he took in the solution of the social problems, his efforts to place the Catholic Church in England in the first rank among the advocates of the cause of place the Cathohe Church in England in the tirst rank among the advocates of the cause of the poorer classes. 
