## ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

**SUBSCRIBER:**—Flushing or general redness of  
the face may be occasioned by an interruption  
of the digestive processes through concentration  
of the mind, or it may come from a fevered con-  
dition of the blood or from a debility of the  
minute blood-vessels of the skin. The cause  
must be sought and overcome if possible, and  
in the meantime, during the recurrences of the  
difficulty, try hot foot-baths. Take plenty of  
exercise, see that no garment is permitted to  
interfere with the circulation, indulge in cold  
bathing and take a good tonic. Stimulate the  
blood vessels by astringent lotions, the follow-  
ing being excellent for the purpose:

Tannic acid, ..... 15 grains.  
Camphor water, ..... 6 ounces.

Dissolve and use several times a day, allowing  
the wash to dry on the face.

**M.**—Consult a surgeon in reference to the  
knee trouble. It is not natural for the eyelashes  
to fall out and a specialist should be consulted  
regarding it. Moles are either flat or raised and  
may or may not thus be a source of annoyance.  
If they bother you, touch them two or three  
times daily for several days with a wooden  
tooth-pick that has been dipped in glacial or  
muratic acid, being careful not to touch the  
skin around the moles. After a short time the  
moles will fall out or shrivel and disappear, but  
each may leave a tiny white scar. Raised  
moles may be treated as follows: Fasten a  
small piece of lunar caustic in a quill; moisten  
each mole night and morning and then rub  
on the caustic, but be careful not to touch  
the healthy flesh. The mole will then turn  
black, and gradually successive skins will  
peel off; and when the spot appears level with  
the other flesh, use a little ointment. Do  
nothing further for a few days. If the mole  
has entirely disappeared, keep applying a heal-  
ing ointment, but if it still appears raised, use  
the caustic again. It is advisable not to inter-  
fere with large moles, as scars will result which  
are more unsightly than the moles. If, how-  
ever, the moles are located so as to cause much  
annoyance, call in the services of a surgeon;  
but do not attempt to remove them yourself.

**FRANCISCO:**—Almost any variety of palm  
leaves may be used for decorative purposes and  
they should be allowed to dry or ripen upon  
the trees. If you wish to sprinkle them with  
diamond dust, first cover with an adhesive sub-  
stance and then sprinkle the diamond dust over  
immediately. The latter may be bought at  
large dry goods stores. These palm leaves  
look very well arranged in halls and above fire-  
places, and wide ribbon tied in a bow about the  
stems adds much to the ornamental effect. A  
Punkaj fan is very graceful and has a long,  
thick handle turned to one side; it is usually  
made to stand against the wall in some corner  
and is often richly embellished with painting,  
embroidery, Japanese characters, figures, etc.
