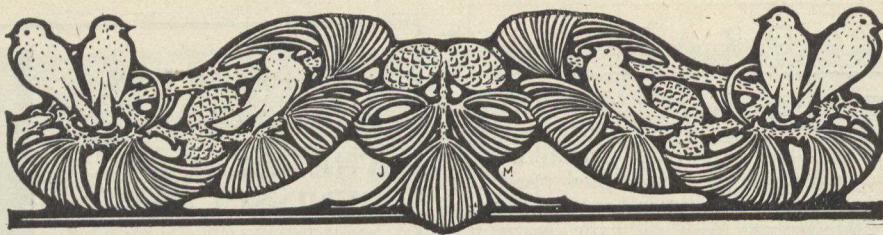

About at Christmas time.

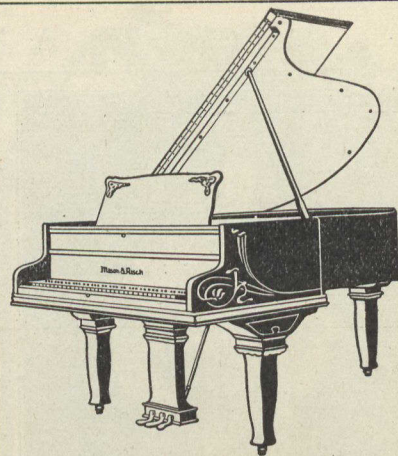
There are no Christmas trees, you see,
