My dear King,

With the latter, I have some acquaintance, but I was still better acquainted with his father, who was one of the stalwarts of Pictou County, when I was a young member, nearly fifty years ago.

As evidence of this, your speech at the Montreal Reform Club has had so great an effect, that friends who thought you could not be a candidate in Maisonneuve are now changing their mind.
