

## XXIV.—Accent.

60. The following words are accented on the last syllable :—

Aděpt, ādūlt, ālcōve, ālly (ā-lí'), awry (ā-ri'), basalt (-sault'), bombast (būm-bāst'), burlesque (bér-lesk'), cement, charade (shā-rād'), cōquēt (kō-kēt'), dīs-cōurse, āccūlt', prētence', (but prē-text), rēcess', rōbūst', tīrāde, commandant', complaisant' (kōm-plā-zānt'), confidānt', imbecile (-sēl'), recitative (-ēv), Capu-chin (-shēn'), bombasin, ambergris (-grēs'), chagrīn, mandarin, palanquin, routine.

N.B.—Bureau, an ordinary piece of furniture, we must, on this side of the Atlantic, call bū'-rō; in the sense of a department of government, we should pronounce it bū-rō'. In all cases we must say dē-pō' (or dēp'-ō), not the vulgar dē-po.

61. The following words are accented on the penult :—

(i.) Often incorrectly accented on the final.

Advêrse, brêvet, brîgând, complex, construe, misconstrue, harass, levee, mattress, mohair.

(ii.) Often incorrectly accented on the antepenult.

anchōvy, calisthēnics, coadjütör, congénér, färrágō, hōrizon, illcīt, intrēpid, plebeian (plē-bé'-ān), pyritēs(-ēz), quandary (kwōn-dā'-rē), sequestrate, stalactites (-tīts), stalagmite, sub-jected, vagāry (vă-gā'-rī), vertigo, vîrágō, canorous, decorous, sonorous.

emetic, fanatic, calorio, panegyric, and most words in -ic.

Cyclopean,	"	"	-ean.
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Colosseum, lyceum, museum,	"	"	-eum.
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albūmen, bitūmen,	"	"	-umen.
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panacea, hymeneal ; aspirant, condolence, coquetry, inquiry, precedence (from *aspire'*, *condole'*, and other words accented on the final), clandestine, compensate, confiscate, contemplate, expurgate, exculpate, illustrate.

The words in this last group have two or more consonants after the last word but one :

Present English usage allows the pronunciations obligā'-tory, orthō'-ēpy (-pī), which are certainly much easier than ob'-liga-tory and or'-thoepy.
