Three Esteemed Citizens Named as License Commissioners in this Constituency

Provincial Secretary Hanna on the Administration of the License Laws-His Letter.

Speaking of the administration of the Liquor License laws, Hon. W. J. Hanna, Previncial Secretary, yesterday intimated the intention of the new Government to adhere to their pledge of a non-partisan administraion of the department.

The new Boards of Commis being appointed are being carefully selected, men being chosen who are respectable and enjoy public confidence. Many splendid names were suggested for West Kent, but, up to yesterday, no definite appointments had been submitted for the Gazette. Next Monday's issue will, however, contain the names.

The same policy govern the whole license department applies to the se-lection of inspectors. While theoretically these officials are appointed from year to year, in practice they held their positions during good behavior. Worthy officials who have done honest and earnest work and are prepared to continue to enforce the laws will be retained, providing they have kept out of the ac tive political arena. "It is the intention of this Gov-

ernment," said the Minister, to give as far as is in its power at honest, earless, strict and impartial administration of the license laws. We are pledged to this and we intend to fulfil our promises to the people who confided in us to the letter."

The following letter from the Minister to Inspector W. A. Mills, received this morning, speaks for it-

in these particulars would not only

It is confidently boped that in a majority of cases this warning is unnecessary, and that in no case will if be unheeded.

Where the number of applications exceeds the number of licenses to be granted, those applications who are personally the most desirable and whose hotels are the best appointed and the most suitable for the public accommodation should always be preferred.

It is the duty of Inspectors to make a fair and impartial report in every instance, so that Boards may have the best and most reliable information before them.

In many counties there are places called hotels which are merely drinking places, the bat being nade the first consideration and accommodation for man and beast but secondary. Make the licenses of such places live up to the requirements or refuse their licenses. Make them keep hotel!

Trusting that your occupancy of the position will be agreeable and pleasant to you, and that you may be able to say that the promise made by the Government as to the rigid enforcement of the law will be faithfully carried out in your district.

The Provincial Government is very opeful that, after all, the shipment of quail ordered from the United States will be allowed to enter this Province. A large consignment of these quail are for the Kent county district, and the news that there is every prospect that the matter will e satisfactorily settled will be

The quail were purchased by the Department some time ago from the south, but the express company held up the shipment in conjunction with the authorities on the ground that the removal of the birds was, in some way, illegal.
