All Government Bills Delayed. OTTAWA, Ont., April 6.—The opposition in the house of commons carried out their threat made recently not to permit any government business for several years and which has prerecently not to permit any government business to go until such time as the tariff bill was brought down. The premier moved that the civil service superannuation bill be taken up. There is a rule of the house that prevents the second reading of a bill until it is published in French as well as English. This bill was only published in English and Mr. Lariviere, who represented Provencher, took advantage of this rule and objected going on with the bill. Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster supported him and the result was that the government were compelled to adjourn the house without doing any business as none of the other government bills were published in French.

He strongly advocated a heavy duty on pulp wood which would build up pulp manufacturing in Canada. At present there are 600,000 cords of pulp wood exported annually to the United States free of duty, for which Canada receives from \$2 to \$3 per cord. This raw material is taken by American capitalists, who put from \$7 to \$11 worth of labor on each cord when manufactured into pulp for paper making and make factured into pulp for paper making, and make an average of about \$9 per cord, thereby depriving Canadian laborers of about \$5,600,000 worth of labor annually on pulp wood alone. This drain on the country must be stopped.
