Sat On a Fire Badly Burned

Peculiar Accident Happen To Six-Year-Old Girl Of Kelligrews

Effie Anthony, a little girl 6 years old of Kelligrews, was brought to town last night for treatment at the General Hospital.

She is very badly burned about the legs and hands and on reaching the hospital received medical attendance without delay.

Her father was at work in his garden yesterday and lighted a fire to burn the rubbish.

The fire had nearly burnt out when the child came along and sat down on the smouldering embers. Her dress ignited and she was soon in flames.

Mr. Anthony was some little distance away, but on hearing her screams he hurried to the scene, and after some difficulty extinguished the blaze.

Although her burns are painful, she will recover and is not likely to suffer the loss of her limbs.

White Fox Cub Born At Truro

First Time Such An Event Has Happened On A Fox Farm

Some valuable foxes, that is valuable in embryo, recently saw the light of day in the vicinity of Truro. Fourteen black ones, whose combined value is estimated at \$84,000. There are ten black pups at the Scotia Island farm, Bible Hill, and four at Mr. L. D. McKenzie's farm, Brookside. We also understand that there is one pure white pup at Mr. McKenzie's ranch. There are, we believe, white wild foxes in Newfoundland, a limited number, of course, rare, but we fancy the one at Mr. McKenzie's ranch is the first one born in captivity.—Hruro Citizen.

Stead, of literary fame, and who was one of the victims in the Titanic disaster, has been undertaken at London with the object of establishing hostels in every city and town of England, at which working women, earning small wages, may be accommodated at low rates. It is expected the movement will in time spread to this side of the Atlantic, and indeed to all parts of the world, and the assistance of every woman's society is hoped for by the promoters, hence the decision of the local W.C.T.U.

Steamer Arrives Needing Repairs

The S.S. Conensy, Capt. James Smyth, 15 days from Antwerp, via Dundee, with a full general cargo for Montreal, arrived at 10 a.m. for repairs, as her stern gland is leaking.

The accident happened during a storm, when she was 7 days out. The pumps were kept going to keep the water from gaining in the hold, but one of the pipes broke and the captain then decided to come here.

The Conensy is 3556 tons gross, 2158 net, 325 feet long, 46 wide and 23 deep. She was built at Stockton in 1897 and is owned by the Conensy Shipping Co., of which W. Williams & Co. are managers. Messrs. Bowring Brothers are agents and Mr. Tasker Cook will look after her supplies.

Lloyd's surveyor Black and Engineer M. McGettigan began the survey this morning. The steamer will likely have to discharge part of her cargo and go on dock for repairs.
