In return for this the city gets the Street Railway and Grand Valley, lock, stock and barrel, and the 38-year franchise is wiped out. The Grand Valley will be wiped out, and it is estimated \$50,000 secured from its disposition. It is more than likely the Street Railway system will be operated by a commission, and to this end an Act of Parliament will have to be secured. The problem is regarded as the biggest which Brantford ratepayers have ever faced.

When it comes to a David Harum street railway deal this city is not far behind. On the arrival of the Mayor and city officials in Toronto yesterday morning they immediately repaired to the room which, in the olden days, was always given to Sir John Macdonald at the Queen's Hotel. It was then and there that the data was collected from the different officials and the offer arrived at, no one having had any previous idea what it would amount to. Thereupon the civic delegation walked over to the office of Mr. McMaster, K.C., the lawyer who had also supported the action for the removal of Mr. Stockdale as receiver. In Mr. McMaster's presence the offer was sealed, on the understanding that it was not to be opened until the bondholders met, and after the offers were submitted action was to be immediately taken. This precaution was taken to prevent the city being outbid at the last moment and the railway knocked down to other interests. The bondholders were to have met at 12 o'clock, but it was 12.40 before the committee, which had met in camera at an earlier hour, came forth and agreed to abide by the ultimatum of the city. For years cases of suiides have been described as due to such games of chance and it has been wide spread believe in Europe that quarreling parties often resort to this American duel."
