MINISTER FIELDING Will Visit England After the Session

Old Loan Will be Re-Issued at a Decreased Rate of Interest.

NOVEL WATER GRANT

Miners Given the Second Right to the Use of 100 Inches

A novel water right was today issued by the gold commissioner to Edward Jansen and Frank L. Lynde, the novelty in the grant being that it is for the second right to water that is already granted to another. The grantees are the owners of the hillside adjoining the lower half, left limit, of 3 Hester creek, and the upper half, left limit, of 3 and 3a Hester creek. They have been given the right for three years to 100 inches of the unappropriated waste water taken from the third reach, left limit, opposite No. 4 Hester creek, subject to the existing rights of water grants No. 748 and No. 1107. Ordinarily, water used on the high benches would after passing through the boxes find its way to creek, but by the grant issued today these who are below the original owners of the water can by means of ditches or reservoirs catch the precious fluid after it has once seen service and divert it to their own use.

Was Killed in a Bar Room Scuffle.

Arrested for Blackmailing

New York, Feb. 27.—Two men have been arrested on the charge of blackmailing an English nobleman out of \$5,000, says a Paris cable to the American. The police decline to furnish the nobleman's name. One of the men arrested, who posed as a police inspector, was captured in a hotel in the Rue Pelletier. The other was captured in Algeria. They met the nobleman on the river and frightened him into paying the money. The victim later complained to the police and the arrests followed.

KILLED ON GOLD HILL

Henry Wadman Meets Death While Engaged in Tearing Down a Cabin—Roof Fell In and Crushed the Unfortunate Victim—Dead When Extricated.

A tragic death occurred on French Hill at ten o'clock this morning of which Henry Wadman a wood dealer was the victim.

Wadman was engaged with his partner in tearing down a cabin on the hill. The work had been in progress for some time and the chief supports of the structure had been withdrawn. Wadman was standing directly beneath the roof when the building caved, the full weight of the roof being precipitated upon the unfortunate man's back.

PLAY WELL RECEIVED

A Packed House Grets "Inshavogue"

Lewis laked a few lines so the delay would not be noticed and then some more. By this time the audience became aware of the faking process and some one yelled "shogit," a cry that was immediately taken up all over the house amidst a general laugh. Still the gun failed to go off and with a sad grin at this having a strong scene spoiled. Bittner said "and may the devil take the property man who loaded the gun." Then was a roar that raised the roof.

Some Comedy Not Down on the Bills Provokes Hilarious Mirth.

A packed house witnessed the production of "Inshavogue" last night at the Auditorium by the Bittner company under the auspices of the Young Men's Institute. Mr. Bittner was the star of the cast, he having played the title role so often that he knows the entire play backward. It is one of his longest character parts and his clever work received the applause it so well merited. The other members of the company were quite acceptable though in one or two instances considerable prompting was necessary. Though a typical Irish melodrama there were one or two comedy scenes enacted that were not down on the bills and while they were provoking in the extreme the audience enjoyed the situations hugely. One occurred at the end of the third act where Brian Maguire (Mr. Bittner) was doing some of the best lines in the play. Right in the midst of a thrilling scene one of the curtains at the back began to slowly ascend heavenward and between his gasps for breath those in the front row could hear the starling out between his clenched teeth, "Put it down; put it down."

Again in the fourth act Lewis' cleverness at faking and Bittner's ready wit was all that saved the scene from going to pieces. As it was it made such a hit that the audience roared. Maguire is in prison and is to be hanged in the morning. His daughter, whom the villain (Lewis) desires is with him to console his last moments. Maguire discovers in his guard an old comrade who in the days gone by could snuff a candle at forty yards. He is engaged in conversation with the prisoner who asks him as a dying favor to shoot out a candle that he will see at one of the grated windows when the clock strikes the hour of midnight, his justification being that he supposed the prisoner was trying to escape. It is understood by the audience that the man condemned to die will hold the candle in front of his breast and receive the bullet intended for the candle thus cheating the executioner out of his prey. The play proceeded without the faintest suspicion of an interruption. The guard had agreed to snuff out the candle for his old friend and Maguire was ready to die. In the meantime the daughter had given her father a file with which he cuts off one of the bars when he is interrupted in his work by the arrival of the villain (Lewis) who comes to taunt the father and daughter in their misery and again vow that he will possess the daughter before the end is reached. Something attracts the villain's attention to the window and he discovers an attempt has been made to escape. He takes the candle and mounts a table to examine the bars more critically and just as he stands in front of the window with the candle before him the clock strikes twelve. Then according to the lines of the play the guard should shoot and the bullet that was intended to put Maguire out of his misery would be received by the villain and in the finale all would end happily.

Lewis picked up his cue perfectly mounted the table, held the candle so the guard could get a good sight and waited for the shot that was to give him his quietus, but it did not come.
