Off for China

Rev. Frank Dickinson and bride left on the 16th, inst., en route for their distant field of missionary work in Chen-tu, Western China, going via Truro and Sackville, where Mr. Dickinson preached before the students of Mount Allison College on Sunday last. They leave Sackville to-day going west via St. John, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Calgary, reaching Vancouver October 6th. At the latter city they will join a party of eighteen other missionaries, embarking on the steamship Euphrates for Russia for Shanghai calling at Hawaii and Tokay. From Sanghai they go to Ichang. They will then take river boats for Chen-tu, the trip up the river covering two to three months, the distance between these two points being about as far as from Yarmouth to Vancouver. At Chen-tu they enter upon their life's work with the Methodist mission, spending the first two years in acquiring language. Their term with the mission is for seven years, when they expect to return to their native land, coming by the way of Russia and England, thus encircling the globe.

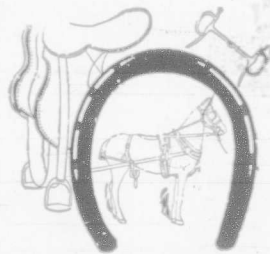
