David Hutchinson

There passed away at his residence Maple View Farm, Escott, on Sunday, March 5th, after three weeks illness of pneumonia, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of this community in the person of David Hutchinson.

Born of U. E. Loyalists parents in the township of Front of Escott, in June, 1829, deceased had long passed the allotted span of life, having reached the ripe age of 81 years and nine months. He had been a life-long resident of the municipality of which he was one of the pioneer agriculturists. Many years ago he surrendered his life to Christ and united with the Methodist church, always retaining his membership and taking a lively interest in all the workings and plans of the church. Being strictly temperate in all his habits, just and honorable in all his dealings, genial and kindly in all his bearings towards others, ever ready to lend a helping hand to those in need, he was truly a friend loved and esteemed by all, both old and young. He is one of whom it may be justly said the world is better for his having lived, and in his death his friends rise up and call him blessed. He is survived by his widow Martha Moxley Hutchinson, three brothers James, Wellington and William, and two sisters Mrs Sarah Cross, and Mrs Martha May, all residents of Michigan, also by six sons, Norman and David, agriculturists and firman, postmaster and township clerk, all of Escott, James B.S.A. of Fort William, Joseph in Mercantile business Spalding Sask., and George M. D. Beinfait Sask. and two daughters Mrs Rev. W. J. Cross of Jackson, Michigan and Mrs T. S. Kendrick of Athens.

The funeral service conducted in the Escott Methodist church on Wednesday at 2 p.m. by the pastor Rev. D. W. Pimroy assisted by Rev. L. N. Beckstedt and Rev. Wm. Wells showed the esteem in which the deceased was held by those who knew him best by being one of the most numerous attended services held here for many years. The subject of the very able address given by the pastor was Psalm 116: 15. In compliance with the wish of the deceased the remains were borne to their last resting place in Union cemetery by his six sons.

To the sorrowing friends it is a consolation to know that "a good man has gone to his reward and that his works do follow him."

For Hospital Aid

At present, hospitals in towns nurse gratuitously many patients from rural municipalities. Some of these municipalities contribute small sums annually and others do not give anything. To remedy this state of affairs, Mr A. E. Donovan, M.P.P., has introduced a bill in the Ontario Legislature, which provides that hospitals may recover from municipalities, other than those in which they are situated. If the patient in question has lived three months in the municipality from which he comes to the hospital, the superintendent is to notify the clerk of the municipality. If within fourteen days the clerk does not notify the superintendent that the patient is not a resident of that municipality it shall be considered that the municipality has assented to the patient's statement. No charge for a public ward shall be more than seventy cents a day.
