The comparative silence of the leading newspapers of the three nations chiefly interested is not the least significant feature

of the incident.

There is no necessity to anticipate war, but the evident effort made by each power to be as strongly represented on the scene as circumstances would permit does not preclude the suspicion that might as well as right cuts some figure in the impending game. From the developments of the past few days there is ground for the supposition that Britain and Germany may have occasion to "call" Uncle Sam's hand on the Monroe doctrine and demand a show down. This does not necessarily mean trouble. But the United States does not appear to know just where it is at itself on the celebrated doctrine and the European powers may have become tired of having to consult Washington regarding each individual case to see whether it conflicts with any of the specifications of the mysterious doctrine. If the United States has a doctrine which it expects the powers to treat tenderly and with distinguished consideration, the safety and comfort of all concerned demand that the United States put that dectrine in plain English or plain German, as the case may be, instead of reserving to itself the right to fire shirt-sleeve, keep-off-the-grass messages at any dignified old power which may quite innocently blunder over an undefined boundary. Common fairness demands that the United States define its position and we are much mistaken if the present naval convention in the Caribbean sea has not as its main object not the collection of a few shekels from Venezuela but the forcing of a diplomatic show-down on the part of Venezuela's patron. TREATY WITH CUBA.

PROVIDES FOR RECIPROCITY WITH UNITED STATES

Signed by Officials, but Must be Rati fied by the Senates of Both Cou

Havana, Dec. 13 .- A definite treat commercial reciprocity between Cuba and the United States was signed late last night by Gen. Bliss and Secretaries Zaldo and Montes. It only lacks the signatures of Secretary Hay and Senor Quesada, and the approval of the United States and Cuban Senates to make it operative. Although the treaty pro-vides for a uniform reduction of 20 per cent. from the present tariff charges on Cuban products entering the United States, a parallel list of products has been drawn up, in which is set forth the reductions on each item made by Cube and the United States respectively. I s impossible now to make any mater changes in this list.

THE MARKET REPORTS.

Deliveries of grain and hay on the street market here to-day was fairly large, but other lines of produce were quiet. Prices showed little chinge. Grain was irregular, hay was firmer, straw was easier and dressed hogs were unchanged. The total offerings of grain were 3,000 bushels.

Wheat-Five hundred bushels of white and 300 bushels of red sold ½c higher at 70c to 70½c, and tool bushels of goose ½c to 1c lower at 64½c to 63c.

Oats-Eight hundred bushels sold ½c lower at 34c to 34½c.

Barley-Eight hundred bushels sold 1c lower at 42c to 43c.

Hay-Timothy sold 59c higher at \$13 to \$15.50 per ton, and clover or mixed \$1 higher at \$6 \$10 per ton. Deliveries were 30 loads. Straw-Two loads of sheaf sold \$1 lower at \$19 to \$11 per ton.

Trade was lively at the Toronto Cattle Market to-day and everything was sold early. The offerings were light and were of a decidedly better quality than usual. The keeu demand for choice stock for the Christmas trade was responsible for the rapidity with which sales were made, and for the best loads the bidding was spirited. There was also a good movement in export cattle, due to the fact that ocean space is available at some of the ports not affected by the New England embargo. Feeders and stockers were quiet, with very light supplies, and buils were almost nominal. Export butchers of a little coarser grade were firmer in sympathy, selling at \$4.75 to \$5.25. Other butchers' were also higher. The medium and low grades were by no means scarce, but they were overlooked in the search for fine stock. After a time they were picked up by dealers who wished to round off their purchases. Bulls—There was very little business and prices were no higher. The tone in the expert market is better, but the offerings are very light. Feeding bulls are also scarce, although the demand for them is fairly steady.

Feeders and Stockers—Receipts were very light and volume of business was necessarily limited. There was a good inquiry and the offerings were soon sold out. Prices were steady to firm.

Mitch Cows—The range of the market was steady at \$35 to \$60, and there was an excellent demand for choice animals. One good cow sold at \$63, and more of the kind would have been taken at that figure. The offerings were fair.

Sheep and Lambs——ere was a better demand for export ewes and prices were 25c higher at \$3 to \$3.25 per cwt. Bucks and culls were unchanged. Lambs were firm and in keen demand at \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt. The day's offerings were light and they did not last long in the face of the active liquiry.

Calves—Market quiet on account of the light receipts. Prices are steady and good yeals sell readily up to \$10 each.
