### GREAT HUNTERS

PRESIDENT KRUGER THE MOST DAR-ING OF ALL

The Boers Are Credited With Freeing South Africa of Llous-Tens of The of Harmless Giraffes Killed for Their Hides - The is very Valuable,

The Boers are credited with being great hunters, and chief of them in his younger days was President Kruger, whose daring in attacking a lion single handed, with a hunting knife, has many times been told. When the Boers migrated from Cape Colony to the Transvaal they were forced to clear the way by killing 6,000 lions, many of which were killed by Kruger. For years the South African Boer have been hunters, and their skill with the knife is due to this daily practce in the fields and woods. But with them the killing of game has been either a matter of dollars ad cents or self protection.

Their creditable work of freeing South Africa of the dreaded lions, which roamed in such numbers that life was rendered unsafe anywhere in the country, is offset by the ruthless destruction of the giraffe from Cape Colony to the Botietli river. If they killed 6,000 lions in the Transvaal before existence was made safe, they may have kalled 60,000 of the innocent, graceful giraffes. In the early days of South African history the giraffe was the most abundant game in the Transvaal, Matabeleland and Orange Free State, but the creatures has been killed off like our American buffalo, and the few remaining represen tatives of a noble race gradually driven north. For years past the giraffe has been a profitable quarry for the Boer hunters, and the animal was valued by them only because the hides were articles of commercial use. They were pot hunted, shot down in droves, and destroyed in the greatest number possible in every direction.

A good giraffe skin is worth from \$10 to \$20 in South Africa to-day, and much more in Europe. On their hunting trips ten and fifteen years ago it was a common matter for one hunter to kill forty and fifty of these graceful animals in one day. The reason for this is that the giraffe is the most innocent of animals and is easily hunted. It is absolutely defenceless, and there is hardly a case on record where a wounded giraffe turned upon the hunter. It is true giraffes have great powers of speed, and they can dodge rapidly from tree to tree in the woods, but they offer such a fair mark that

these tactics hardly ever save them. The hide of the animal is its chief article of value. No wonder that the bullets often fail to penetrate this skin, for it is from three-quarters to an inch thick, and as tough as it is thick. The skin, when cured and tanned, makes excellent leather for certain purposes The Boers make riding whips and sandals out of the skins they do not send to Europet The bones of the giraffe have also a commercial value. The leg bones are solid instead of hollow, and in Europe they are in great demand for manufacturing buttons and other bone articles. The tendons of the giraffe are so strong that they will sustain an enormous dead weight which gives them pecuniary value.

Moccasins the Best Footwear.

The moccasin is the most rationa and comfortable of all footwear. In moccasins the feet have full play; they can bend and grasp: there is nothing to chate them or impede circulation. In moccasins one can move like an acrobat, crossing slender and slippery logs, climbing trees or passing with ease and security along dizzy trails on the mountain side, where a slip might mean sure destruction.

The feet do not stick fast in the mud. In the north, when the mercury is far below zero and no civifized boot will protect the feet from freezing, the savage suffers no inconvenience. His moccasins, stuffed with dried grass, let the blood course freely. The perspiration may freeze on the hay in a solid lump of ice, but the feet remain warm and dry.

The buckskin moccesin, Indian tanned, with deers' brains and wood smoke always dries soft after a wetting In autumn, when all the leaves and twigs are dry as tinder, a man wearing shoes makes a noise in the forest like a troop of cavalry. But in moccasins he can move swiftly through the woods with the stealth of a panther. The feet are not bruised, for after enjoying for a time the freedom of natural covering, these hitherto blundering members become like hands and feel their way through the dark, like those of a cat avoiding obstacles, as though gifted with a special sense. Best of all, the moccasin is light. Inexperienced eportsmen and soldiers affect high-topped laced boots with heavy soles and hobnails, imagining that these are most serviceable for rough weather. But these weigh be-tween four and five pounds, while a pair of thick moose-hide moccasins weigh only eleven ounces. In marching ten miles a man wearing the clumboots lifts twenty tons more shoe leather than if he wore moccasins.
