We are very sure that so far as a judicious yet firm maintenance of these factors can be advanced by a Speaker, Mr. Speaker Eberts will exhibit the necessary qualities.

"We congratulate Mr. Eberts upon his selection, and we congratulate the House upon having so efficient a presiding officer."
