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ontario's Need of Fackers

Although Canadian fruit finds a ready market wherever shipped, he found that it was being replaced by foreign fruit. Even in Winnipeg most of the fruit sold there came from California. This, he thought, was due to the fruit growers of Ontario having no concerted action. Each packer ships his own product, and there is no uniformity. We can produce the fruit, but to find a ready sale, it must be presented in proper form. This can only be done by co-operation.
