Editorial Notes.

We have pleasure in announcing that the ACADIAN ILLUSTRATED is off the press and will be ready for distribution in a few days.

Mayor Thomson contributed \$10.00 to the strenuous expenses at Windsor on Dominion Day. We are glad to note public spirited acts of this nature.

The result of the post-reef competition at Windsor on Dominion Day is certainly very gratifying to citizens of Wolfville. The Windsor team is a crack one and our boys are certainly to be congratulated.

The professors of the College have been engaged during recent weeks attending the Baptist associations of the three provinces. Prof. Wortman returned a few days ago from the Western Nova Brunswick Association, and Prof. E. W. Sawyer from the Western Nova Scotia.

Haying operations have been fairly commencing this week. The crop on the Wickwies and Port Williams dikes is reported as good, but the Grand Pre does not make nearly so good a showing as last year.

At the closing of the Normal School at Truro, on June 29th, Dr. Trotter delivered the formal address. The Truro Daily News, in its account of the exercises, speaks of the address as follows:

"Dr. Trotter, of Acadia, gave the address of the occasion. It was his first address in the Normal School and it is not too much to say that it was one of the best ever delivered in the institution. The subject was: 'The dignity of the Teaching Office.' The speaker showed with much force and in faultless diction the grandeur of the work to be performed by that other class of humanity, the teacher.

Miss Jennie W. Ross, M. A., has received the appointment to the principalship of the Kings County Academy, as successor to Mr. Angus McLeod. Miss Ross has a reputation for excellent scholarship and pedagogical ability, and has spent a considerable apprenticeship as an instructor under Mr. McLeod.

On Wednesday, July 6th, the annual provincial examination for High School Certificate commenced in the rooms of the Wolfville high school. Professor Wortman fills the office of deputy examiner as usual.

The popular steamer of the Yarmouth Steamship Co. now makes four trips per week to and from Boston, as will be seen by adv. in another column. This company is evidently bound to maintain its position in the high seas, they deserve to hold to the situation of the travelling public. Steamers now leave Boston at 2 p. m. instead of at noon, as formerly.
