THE CASE OF MR. CARVELL

F. B. Carvell having declared in the House of Commons his intention to discuss the record of the Hon. Robert Rogers and the work of the McLeod-Tellier commission which recently gave to Mr. Rogers a certificate of character, the Standard newspaper threatens the member for Carleton with political extinction. The Standard has been making similar threats for some years past. At short intervals it informs its readers that Mr. Carvell's political career is run, that he is about to disappear, that his activities have been futile, and that his place in public life will soon be filled by another. Presumably the Standard means that it will be filled by Hon. J. K. Fleming, for at last accounts Mr. Fleming still was the regularly nominated candidate for the Conservative machine for Carleton-Victoria. The Standard has not withdrawn its candidate, and Mr. Fleming has not himself signified any desire to lay down the party standard, which was proudly placed in his hands by the Conservative leaders at a somewhat memorable convention. We do not present these circumstances as necessarily embarrassing to the Standard. It is accustomed to such things for it lives always as an apologist for a machine whose raw political crimes long since disgusted the better element in the Conservative party. F. B. Carvell was very recently heralded by the Conservative press, and even in the Ottawa correspondence of the Standard newspaper, as a fearless outstanding Canadian commanding the appreciation of all good citizens. Recently, however, Mr. Carvell found it necessary in pursuance of his duty to the House of Commons to expose and chastise some of the more conspicuous Conservative party idols, and because of this the Standard dutifully takes up the task of maligning him to its puzzled subscribers.

But there is another reason for the Standard's foolish malignity, and a moving reason it is, too. Recently as counsel before one or two royal commissions investigating some of the more notorious transactions occurring under the Murray-Baxter government, Mr. Carvell fearlessly dealt with some of the activities of certain directors of the Standard newspaper. Mr. Carvell is an axeman who hews to the line, and is careless as to where the chips may fall. They have fallen thick and fast before the door of the Standard newspaper.

The Carvell axe is at rest for the moment, but soon it will begin to swing once more, with what result time will tell. Mean-

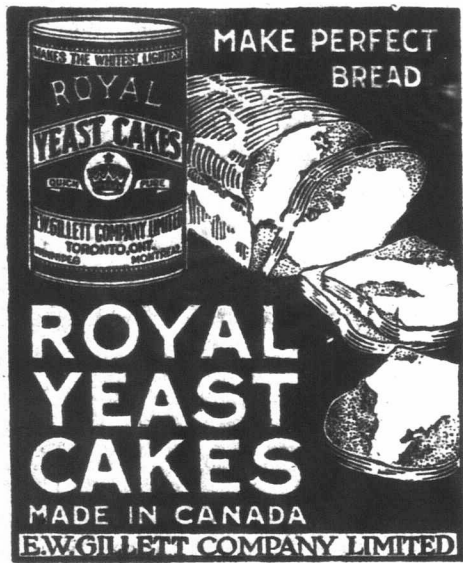
