

There were several lots of good cattle, that sold up to 85 per cwt., but there were many—the bulk of those on sale—that were of common to medium quality, which sold at about the same prices as were paid last week.

Exporters.—There were none bought for export, unless it was a few bulls, which were worth from \$3.50 to \$4.25 per cwt.

Cases in New York.

New York, Oct. 1.—Sixty-one indictments, all growing out of the life insurance investigation, against eighteen defendants, who were formerly officials of leading insurance ocmpanies, will appear on the calendars of the Criminal Courts for Monday. dars of the Criminal Courts for Monday.

District Attorney Jerome announced that he would dispose of these cases quickly. Preliminary motions will be made in some of the cases, with a probability of delay until the Appeliante Courts have plassed upon the points raised, while other trials should proceed at once. First of the cases will be that of Dr. Walter R. Gillette, formerly vice-president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, who was indicted for forgery and perjury.
