HOUSES FLOODED.—The houses near Browning's Bridge were flooded Thursday night by the raising of the river. In some of the houses the residents had to take refuge in the upstairs apartments. The road was covered to a depth of four feet. The flood subsided last night.

Yesterday afternoon a girl 18 years old, a patient in the General Hospital, was found to be suffering from diphtheria, and was sent to the Fever hospital for treatment. The disease seems to be clinging to this place and no effort should be spared to stamp it out there.

The people residing in nearby outports have come to the city to be present at the service at Lyon Building, Water Street, which are held daily by a Rabbi.

LONDON, To-day.

A procession of members of the Church of England, consisting of 500 clergymen, 2,500 laymen and 700 choirboys, paraded from Trafalgar Square to St. Paul's Cathedral in the presence of an immense crowd. CHANNEL, April 13.

Sealer Injured.

Shortly after the Bonaventure left St. Paul's Island one of the crew of the Harlaw, A. Somerton, of Portugal Cove, met with an accident which came near costing him his life. He was walking along a narrow deck, did not see the bunker hatch open and tripping was precipitated into it, falling to the bottom a distance of 15 feet and striking heavily on a number of old bars, etc. He was rendered unconscious in which condition he remained for two days. Minutes, and was quickly lifted to the deck. Capt. Cross and Harbour gave first aid and found that the man's face was laid open, his hand terribly lacerated and his head also cut and bruised. The cuts were cleaned and bound up after which the man revived, but he suffered severely and was in a dazed condition for two days. When the man fell those on the ship expected him to be killed instantly and his escape was a marvelous one.

PARIS, March 31.—The sentence of three years imprisonment imposed upon M. Lacour, the royalist, for an assault upon former Premier Briand, was to-day confirmed by the higher court.

WASHINGTON, April 14.

The Reciprocity Bill was laid before the Senate to-day. The body adjourned until to-morrow, when consideration of the bill begins.

The House of Representatives, by a vote of 296 to 16, has passed the Rucker resolution, proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for the direct election of United States Senators.

WASHINGTON, April 14.

A clause in the Canadian Reciprocity Bill, inserted by the Democratic House caucus, providing that the President shall continue negotiations with Canada to secure further reciprocal relations, will not in any way jeopardize the bill itself, in the opinion of political leaders of both parties. The clause does not affect the provisions outlined in the original bill which was agreed on after protracted negotiations between the agents of Canada and the United States; it merely opens up the way for future negotiations.

OTTAWA, April 14.

An Indian uprising is imminent in Keewatin. The hunting season proved unsuccessful and the Indians are reported to be on the verge of starvation. A detachment of the Mounted Police has been mobilized at Winnipeg and is leaving for the scene of the trouble.
