(Before Mr. Justice Johnson.)
Holmwood & Holmwood vs. R. Moulton.

This is an action which was before the Court in November, 1909, some evidence was put in and a commission was issued to take evidence in Naples and Oporto, the evidence thus taken and correspondence were put in to-day.

The action is to recover \$17,515.25 for money paid by the plaintiff for the defendant and for work and services done and performed by the plaintiff for the defendant as the brokers and agents of the defendant.

This morning the Attorney General appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. Farlong, K.C., for defendant.

Mr. Frederick W. Senior was examined by the Attorney General and cross-examined by Mr. Farlong, K.C. Some correspondence was put in evidence.

Fishermen Protest Against Trawlers

Gloucester Interests Name Committee to Conduct Campaign.

Gloucester, Oct. 4.—A strong protest of the fishing and vessel owning interests against the use of the otter and beam trawl was voiced at the rooms of the Master Mariners' Association this afternoon, when at one of the most largely attended meetings in recent years, the association went on record as condemning this method of fishing, and appointed a committee to take up the active work of crystallizing this feeling among the master mariners, fishermen and fishing vessel owners at any and every possible port and later urge governmental action in the shape of prohibition legislation.

Vice-President Peter Grant presided and speeches were made by Captains Jerome McDonald, Henry W. Atwood, Alfred Johnson, Carl C. Young, Norman A. Ross and others. A committee was appointed to consider the matter, comprising Capt. Henry M. Atwood, chairman, Capt. J. W. McFarland, Capt. John A. McKinnon, Capt. Carl C. Young and Capt. Charles H. Harby.

It was also voted to invite Congressman Gardner to meet the people here, so that he could learn their feelings in the matter.

The Hygienic Aspects of Gas Lighting and Cooking.

Experiments were made at the Lewisham Infirmary during the month of November 1910, with the following in view:—

(1) To compare hygienically the relative values of the open fire and the Gas Radiator as warming agents.

(2) To ascertain if, and to what extent, the quality of the atmosphere of a room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps.

(3) To ascertain the hygienic value of the gas fire.

The experiments were carried out by Dr. F. S. Toogood, M.D., London, D.P.H., the Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary, and the full report of the experiments appeared in the London Medical Magazine, February 1911.

The general conclusions arrived were as follows:—

(1) That both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation gas consumed in modern incandescent burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.

(2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sickroom in respect of its reliability, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust producing propensities, and saving of both work and anxiety, are obvious to every professional man or woman.

(3) That in large rooms, adequately ventilated, fuelless gas stoves can be used for heating without any hygienic disadvantages, the heated products of combustion (mainly C O₂ and water vapour) ascending quickly above breathing level. This method of heating by radiation and convection from fuelless gas stoves, is economical, but proper ventilation of the buildings in which it is adopted is essential, which, of course, is also the case whatever means of heating is adopted. A ward or other public building in which gas radiators cannot be used with advantage is improperly ventilated.

Big Water Tank Falls at Hamilton

Workers in Grocery Warehouse Had Narrow Escape From Death.

Hamilton, Ont., October 4.—It is estimated that damages to the extent of \$20,000 were inflicted yesterday afternoon as the result of the water tank on the roof of the Geo. E. Bristol Co. building toppling over. The employees of the grocery warehouse and of the Copley, Noyes and Randall and the John E. Brown Co. heard a crackling of timber followed by a loud crash and a deluge of water. Only the instinct of curiosity prevented a fatality for when the crash came every one in the warehouse rushed to the front windows. The roof of the Bristol warehouses was torn off and the big tank as it crashed from the third story to the cellar crushed much destruction. It was thought at first that one man had been killed but an investigation showed that none had been injured or killed.

The First Escalator.

In England in Operation To-Day.

London, Oct. 4.—The first escalator, or moving stairway, introduced into England is in operation to-day at the Barle Court Station. It will carry ten thousand passengers hourly, and will do more work than six ordinary lifts. The traffic by the deep level tube is so heavy that the lifts are overstrained and passengers are delayed.

If the experiment succeeds, similar double-stairs, moving up and down simultaneously, will be constructed at other stations of the underground system. One was tried in Berlin ten years ago, and another was in operation at the Paris Exposition, but the system is still a novelty in Europe, although it has been satisfactorily tested in Canada and the United States.

But most interesting of all is the sword with which he defended himself, the same that Napoleon I. wore at Arcola, at Austerlitz and at Waterloo.

It was not a sword of state, but a plain fighting sword in a simple sheath. When King Cetewayo was conquered this sword, which had terrified Europe, was found among the spoils in his kraal.
