

Died in Action.

An official message to Mr. A. J. Boone, of Millertown, conveys the information that his brother Gordon Valentine Boone, had fallen on the field of honour in the fierce battle of Saturday last. Gordon Boone was one of the first Newfoundlanders to be recorded in response to the call for volunteers. He was at Ontario when the call came and he immediately enlisted with the Canadian Artillery Corps, and sailed with the first contingent. He was the son of the late Samuel A. Boone, of Queen's Road, and was one of the most popular young men of this city. He was an ex-pupil of Bishop Field College where he had a most distinguished career. He was foremost in the College work and was a prominent athlete and represented the Pellidians in all branches of sport. He will be remembered as a good cricketer, hockeyist and footballer. When he left school in 1904 he joined the engineering staff of the Reid Newfoundland Co. and later went to Mount Allison University. Having completed his studies he went to Peterboro, Ontario, whence he enlisted.

One sister, Mrs. John Mathieson, of Topsail Road, and one brother, Mr. A. J. Boone, of Millertown, are left to mourn, to whom the sympathy of all Newfoundland will go out.

The young soldier was about thirty years of age. He was a member of St. John's Lodge A. F. and A. M.

Eagle in Port.

MAILS FOR TEN THOUSAND.

The S. S. Eagle, Capt. E. Bishop, arrived in port from the northern sealfishery at 10 p.m. yesterday, having for 10,000 prime harp seals. As previously mentioned in the Telegram, the Eagle was within sight of seals during the greater part of the season but was unable to work them because of ice conditions. After getting clear the crew killed about 15,000 seals in two days, but only two-thirds of that number were recovered. While in search of old seals a wireless was received from the Bloodhound asking for assistance whereupon the Eagle took her in tow and brought her to land. Since then the Eagle has been trying to get home, having had to leave the Bloodhound at Pool's Island. She brought along some of the crew of the Bloodhound and landed several others from points in Bonavista and Trinity Bays at Gambo on Sunday last. On the way here from Westville, which port she left on Tuesday afternoon, the Eagle steamed through very heavy ice. The captain and crew are all well.



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Five Million Pounds

Splendid Total of Prince's Fund.

The Prince of Wales' National Relief Fund yesterday totalled £5,012,000.

A further contribution of £25,000 from Glasgow (making a total of £207,700) and £5,000 from Derbyshire enabled this total to be reached.

The fund, which is the biggest relief fund ever raised, owes its being to an appeal which was issued by the Prince of Wales on August 6. Within a day £250,000 was raised and within seven days the first million was reached. The dates of the progress of the fund are as follows:

Fund started August 6, 1st million August 14; 2nd million, September 2; 3rd million, October 5; 4th million, December 2; 5th million, April 26. The Transvaal War Fund from October 1899 to March 1902 reached £1,131,000.

The attainment of £5,012,000 in 262 days represents a daily income of nearly £19,130.—Daily Mail, April 27th.


