### Our Represent- ative.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—It was with deep interest  
that I read your editorial in Thurs-  
day's issue, and know that it will  
greatly interest the public of the  
Dominion. But our people whilst  
they may applaud your editorial, are  
apparently very apathetic to most  
matters of public interest, and whilst  
they may say "Them's my sentiments"  
—they are most unlikely to write  
you and say "At-a-boy," which  
would be more visible encouragement  
that you had good support behind  
you. Knowing this to be the case, I  
have thought you might like to know  
that there is a good bunch behind you  
in this matter and we trust that you  
will "carry on." It may be urged by  
the Opposition papers that it is not  
the Opposition papers that say anything  
that might not show an appreciation  
of "Our Premier," now that his back  
is turned. But forseeing that, I may  
say that Dr. Lloyd did not have the  
ordinary politeness to tell "his people"  
that he was back behind you.  
He might have called a meeting of  
the Board of Trade before he went,  
it being one of the most represen-  
tative, intelligent and impartial bodies  
in the country. He might have asked  
of their ideas upon various questions  
which are likely to come up at an In-  
ter-Allied Conference. He might have  
called a meeting of the men who have  
fought for their country, and got their  
ideas. It is possible that for these  
meetings the Health Regulations  
which have been relaxed, though it is  
not improbable that Dr. Lloyd may  
say it was concern for the public  
which prevented him from holding  
such meetings.  
But as the Silent Doctor silently  
slipped away, folding his tent like the  
Arabs, some of us, besides yourself,  
Mr. Editor, feel like saying a few  
words. We agree with you that the  
present party might have dropped  
politics for the nonce and sent a re-  
presentative free-born Newfoundland-  
er, and that the man who would in  
the highest degree represent us with  
fitting dignity and honour to the Do-  
minion was Sir Robert Bond.  
We also agree with you that Dr.  
Lloyd is not representative of the  
people of Newfoundland, being merely  
a political puppet placed in that po-  
sition by a gang of politicians who also  
hold their position by what has been  
called the "Silent Doctor" system.  
We would have had in Sir Robert  
Bond, one of the world's finest orators  
and not merely the best speaker in  
Newfoundland. We would have had a  
deeper thinker, a clearer thinker, and  
feared in expression, as both a man  
and a gentleman. In Sir Robert  
Bond we should have had a statesman,  
and one who has at all times shown  
himself a far-seeing and Imperial  
Statesman.  
In Dr. Lloyd we have merely a po-  
litical puppet with views controlled by  
a bunch of politicians whose views even  
in Imperial matters, we know are  
controlled by mere self-interest and  
where a body of men are controlled  
merely by self interest it is not impos-  
sible that self interest might control  
their actions.  
Even giving them the benefit of the  
doubt, and even supposing that Dr.  
Lloyd, poor man, may mean well, he  
does not represent us, and cannot do  
Newfoundland the good that a capable  
representative like Sir Robert Bond  
would.  
In closing I may say that if Sir  
Robert Bond came to lead a party  
this fall even (with hardly any cam-  
paign) he has the whole country be-  
hind him, and will go in with a record  
majority.

### Lung Taken Out Sewed Put Back.

Fort Oglethorpe, Ga.—"I have re-  
moved the human lung from the chest  
cavity with forceps, tied its bleeding  
blood vessels, cleaned its outer sur-  
face, and while still holding it in my  
hands and manipulating it, I  
would a handkerchief, I have run thin  
pieces of gauze up its trachea. Feeling  
my way carefully along the trachea, I  
have removed a bullet or shell frag-  
ment. I have placed the respiratory  
organ back into the cavity of the  
chest. In two-thirds of the cases up-  
on which I have operated the pa-  
tient lived."

officers of the American Army at  
Camp Greentree by Colonel F. W. Jones,  
val of the French Reserve Medical  
Corps. Colonel Duval is here with ten  
of the foremost surgeons of England,  
France and Italy, to attend the Inter-  
Allied War Conference of Surgeons.  
The medical experts are on a tour of  
large cities to give first-hand infor-  
mation to the medical fraternity of  
military surgery as practiced and de-  
veloped in base and evacuation hos-  
pitals at the front.

### Two Miles a Minute.

A new record time for  
the flight between Dayton,  
Ohio, and Pittsburgh was claimed to-  
day by James M. Schoemaker, Jr.,  
of the Vice-President of the Pitts-  
burgh and Lake Erie Railroad, who  
covered the distance of 228 miles in a  
specialized battleship in 1 hour and  
45 minutes. An average speed of  
more than two miles a minute was  
maintained.  
Schoemaker, who is chief  
pilot of the Dayton-Wright Air-  
plane Company, received a telephone  
call that his father, who just  
undergone an operation, was  
very ill. He immediately decided  
to make a flying visit to his bedside.  
After permission to use a De  
Havilland battleship. With Howard  
Carter as co-pilot, he left Wright  
field at 11:15 a.m. and landed  
at 1 p.m. on Brunots Island.  
Schoemaker said the fastest pre-  
cedent airplane time between  
Dayton and Pittsburgh was 2 hours  
and 15 minutes.
