The Empress displayed signs of deep emotion, but how the former Emperor took the news, the Associated Press is unable to ascertain. Rumors were however in circulation that he attempted to commit suicide by hanging, but these are considered incor-

#### GREY DELIGHTED.

PARIS, May 12. Viscount Grey says in an interview that he is delighted with the amended covenant of the League of Nations, having feared "that much less might accomplished at the Conference.'

#### CREATING CONFUSION.

PARIS. May 12. The Four Council decided yesterday upon the terms of the reply to be made to the two notes sent to Clemenceau, Saturday evening, by Brockdorff Rantzau. The first of these asked that there be a reciprocal policy adopted as to repatriation of prisoners, and requested that details of transfer he placed in the hands of a comission. In the second note the German delegates advanced a counter proposal as to International Labor Legislation, but according to the newspapers, the basis of the second note is the labor charter inspired by the conferences at Leeds and Berne, and they argue that the purpose is to create among Socialists an opinion porable to Germany, they plotting in direct collaboration with the working classes and the present governments
