EVIDENCE OF PROSPERITY.

If the commercial progress and accumulating wealth of a community are to be gauged by the improvements and additions to its buildings, then St. John's is on the crest of a high wave of prosperity. The many additions, structurally, during the past decade, go to prove that the future possibilities of a continuing era of success in business are not regarded as a myth by those who are in the best position to know. And hence they are using their knowledge to improve, and otherwise beautify, by the erection of commodious and up-to-date buildings, a city which possesses natural advantages and only needs modern methods to make it second to none so far as layout and system will go. It is rather a promising sign of the times to note the great rivalry existing amongst the Canadian Banking institutions in St. John's, each one being inspired to have the most complete and convenient suite of offices for the carrying on of their system, and the better satisfaction of their numerous patrons and customers. If the standard of the commercial prosperity of St. John's, Newfoundland is to be measured by the wonderful advance in the growing business of the banks established here, the confidence with which the management and directorate of these financial institutions view the future must communicate itself to our people and give them a feeling of security which otherwise would be lacking. The barometer of trade is closely watched by bank managers, and even for them it does not always "Set Fair" any more than it does for those who are putting through daily transactions, yet their advice is eagerly sought and acted upon, and seldom indeed is it that their judgment of financial probabilities is faulty.

Buttressing this premise then, the erection of two magnificent buildings such as the Bank of Commerce and the Royal Bank have on hand, the former's being rapidly approaching completion, is gratifying proof that there is no fear of any financial disaster to this dominion. The signs of the times as well as the commercial weather glass all point to Set Fair, and such encouragement as the Banks give us of the presence of prosperous conditions, should be correspondingly stimulating. The times look promising. The trade is fast recovering from set backs caused by the war. The wheels of every industry are beginning to turn and move on re-oiled and re-adjusted bearings. The outlook is more hopeful, now that the dark clouds of conflict have been dissipated by the rising sun of peace, and the marts of the world are demanding increased production in order to supply the demand. Newfoundland can well avail of the opportunities offered, and the inducements held out. There is ample scope and wide areas for

the disposal of our products than have hitherto been open to us, and with the ever-increasing demand of the world for more and still more food supplies, the portals of markets heretofore unknown to the trade are flung wide for the reception of all that we can send through their gates. In a word the world wants fish and fish can be supplied by this colony in abundance. Prospects perhaps were never better for the reconquest of old and the capture of new markets abroad. The Banks believe that the future is bright. They are making preparations to meet the additional business inseparable from prosperity and progress. They have faith in the ability of this dominion to make good, because they know that the resources of nature are behind us. Shall we not imitate their faith and keep the machinery of increased trade and commerce ever in motion. The catch cries of dismal jimmies must not be taken seriously. Always have there been pessimists wailing their tales of misfortune in the streets, but their day is ended. The sun of prosperity is rising in a clear sky and the watchwords are optimism and faith.

Local Trappers Make Good Hauls.

The trap fishery on the local grounds yesterday was the best for some time past. At both the morning and evening hauls the traps were filled with large sized fish. Many hook and line men assisted in securing the catch and incidentally received a boat load for their services. Up to yesterday very little had been done with fish and trap owners were fearing a bad voyage. However, yesterday's good work has made things look promising.

The Woodford Enquiry.

All of yesterday's sitting of the Commission appointed to enquire into the Woodford Affidavit was taken up with the examination of Messrs. Woodford and Howley, K.C., counsel for the former. There are not any developments expected until Thursday's session, and the time between yesterday and then will be occupied by the Commissioners in considering who they will call upon to give evidence on that day. The answers to the questions of Comissar Rendell by Mr. Woodford are most interesting and refreshing and indubitably show that there was something doing when the unexpected gains were made. Truly the way of the professional politician, like that of other unmentionable persons, is hard.

League Football.

There was a fair attendance at last evening's football match between the Highlanders and the Britons. During the progress of the game Reid of the Highlanders, received a kick on the leg and had to retire from the field. The Briton's team put up a rattling fine exhibition, while Patterson of the Highlanders, played well for his team. The game was won by the Britons' by a score of 3 to nil. The gate receipts amounted to \$87.

Noble and Generous Sympathy

At Barbados for a Mariner's Widow.

In the early morning of Sunday, 6th June, 1920, Peter Drew, of Bay Bulls, Nfld., mariner of the British barque 'Madeleine Constance,' lying at Barbados, accidentally met his death by drowning in the carenage at said port. Soon after the body was discovered, the flags of all the vessels in harbor, of which there were twelve Newfoundlanders, were seen at halfmast. Capt. Coward, of the 'Madeleine Constance,' with the assistance of Mr. Henry Taylor, shipping clerk of Messrs. Hanschell & Co., Ship Brokers and Ship Chandlers, arranged the details of inquest and funeral. In the afternoon of the same day, the funeral was held at the Westbury Cemetery, officiated by the Rev. Father Besant, of the Catholic Church in Barbados. The funeral was well attended, Capt. Coward and his men being present, as well as other mariners and friends.

On the following day, at the instance of Capt. Coward, Mr. A. J. Hanschell, partner of the firm of Messrs. Hanschell & Co., opened a subscription list with the object of raising funds for a suitable stone to be placed over the deceased's grave, and the ready and generous response from the captains, crews and friends in the port of Bridgetown, resulted in Mr. Hanschell being able, after paying for the cost of a marble slab and enclosure, to send the deceased's widow a cheque for fifty odd pounds.

It is indeed a pleasure for us to record in our columns this noble and generous action on behalf of the widow of one of our countrymen, whose mortal remains lie buried on an island in the far off Caribbean Sea; and our readers will, we feel sure, agree with us that such acts as these, on the part of fellow-mariners towards a deceased brother in a far distant clime is worthy of great praise, adding as it does another example of the very high principles practised by sailors who go down to the sea in ships.
