It really is terrific when you stop to think of it how much our lives are influenced by what other people think of our ways of living, or even by what we think they think. If it were the people we love and want to please, that would not be so strange, but often it is the people we don't love at all and don't have the least desire to make happy who hold this strange power over us. I often meditate on this subject when I find myself troubled that "Mrs. S. will think it queer," or "Mrs. I. will wonder," and so on, and the other day I read a story that was a wonderful example of this influence—and incidentally of what I call a crackling good story.

A Single Sentence Influences. I wonder if you read it, too. An

elderly couple have inherited some money. They are on their way home from the lawyer's office and considering what they shall do and their first plan is to get rid of M., a little orphan girl whom they had taken from an institution and trained as a maid. M. is very capable and efficient but because of her own sweetness of disposition and their natural friendliness they have let her become almost like a member of the family instead of a maid. And (mark this well) only a week ago Mrs. Nelson, a friend, drinking tea with them had said, "I wonder you allow that girl to join in the conversation unasked. If she was a servant of mine I wouldn't like it."

It seems to me that all that follows flows out of that sentence. You can just see Mrs. Crane's mind going back to it when she plans to get rid of the adorable little M., and have "two smart servants, wearing caps and starched aprons," take her place. Won't Mrs. Nelson be surprised when

the respectful parlor maid lets her in the front door, she is thinking.

The Ending.  
I needn't tell you the denouement of the tale. You can probably work it out for yourself or better still, find it in one of the current magazines and read it. But isn't it true to life, the way that sentence rankles and makes Mrs. Crane blind to the adorable qualities of her little maid and friend, ready to do a cruel thing, insensitive to feelings of which she would naturally have been tender. Sometimes it is things we think people think, things they have never said at all that influence or annoy us.

I once knew a young, married woman who made herself perfectly wretched because she thought her sister-in-law thought that she ought not to have urged her husband to buy their new house. As a matter of fact the sister-in-law never thought anything about the matter at all—at least if one could tell by what she said.

Why Should She care? But supposing she had. Either it was right to have bought that house or it was not. The woman and her husband were in a position to judge that matter better than anyone. What difference should it make to the wife what her sister-in-law, whom she cordially disliked, thought.

Of course one is foolish not to let what others really do think have any influence on one's judgments. Other people have a different point of view on our affairs and that has its value. But on the other hand it is foolish to let other people's viewpoints have undue influence. The balance between the two extremes is beautifully expressed in Kipling's "If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, But make allowance for their doubting, too."

### Massaged Heart.

Wonderful efforts to revive a woman whose heart stopped beating during an operation were described at the inquest at Park Royal Hospital on Lillian Lane, aged thirty-one a domestic servant.

It was stated that Lane suffered from a goitre, and an operation was performed. The operation was nearly finished when she stopped breathing. Injections were given, and then cardiac massage—an operation performed by opening the chest and massaging the heart—was resorted to, but without success. The coroner said it was clear that everything possible had been done to save the woman's life, and returned a verdict of "Death by misadventure."

### Legislative Council.

MONDAY, May 15.

The House opened at 4 p.m. when the following bills passed second reading:

"An Act respecting War Pensions," "An Act further to amend Chapter 25 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Customs'."

"An Act to amend Chapter 35 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Postal and Telegraph Services'."

When the leader of the Government moved the second reading of the Bill relating to Customs Bonds, Sir P. T. McGrath took occasion to remark that the movement to abolish this accommodation was desirable, but it was regrettable that the step had not been taken several years ago when business men were in a better position to stand the wrench.

Hon. R. K. Bishop (Gov.) said he could not see any justifiable reason for the step. As the bonds were preferential he did not believe the Government would lose anything on the outstanding amounts. The discontinuing of the practice of taking bonds, he said, was an unnecessary hampering of trade, as he could not see any specific reason for the Government's action. He asked to have a statement showing the loss sustained by the Customs during the past ten years owing to duty bonds.

Hon. F. McNamara, supporting the remarks made by Sir Patrick McGrath, said he knew that the privilege of Customs Bonds had been flagrantly abused, and in this particular he mentioned dealers in tobacco and sugar. The practice was unfair to many firms, inasmuch that taking advantage of the Bonds the importers would sell at cost or below upon arrival of the goods and the money so obtained was diverted to other enterprises. Mr. McNamara, in conclusion said that in all parts of the world duties were payable in gold, and a like system should prevail here.

Hon. George Shea in moving the Bill to Committee, said that the matter of the abolition of the Bonds was brought to a head because it had been learned that the concessions had been grossly abused as was pointed out by Hon. Mr. McNamara.

Several bills were given a first reading, after which the House adjourned until Wednesday next at 4 p.m.
