Reported Award. Reported Award.

Washington, Sep. 9.—The Government has received official telegraphic information from Geneva that the arbitration on the Alabama claims has closed, and that the results of its deliberations will be promulgated on Saturday next. A member of the Cabinet who has been thoroughly informed of every step taken in the Treaty, and under its provisions believes that the award to the United States-will be from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000 in gold, which will be satisfactory to this Government. He says that the American members of the Joint High Commission were unanimously of opinion that twelve million would be a just and suitable sum for England to pay. During the sittings of the Commission: it was announced to the British Commissiones that the American members were prepared to state the amount they would announced to the British Commissioners that the American members were prepared to state the amount they would take in bulk in payment of the claims, but this offer was declined. Nothing remains to be done by the Arbitrators but to sign the documents officially and compare the 'various translations, which will be done to-morrow. The Government does not expect to know the amount to be received from England until the last of the present week. It is also expected that about the same time the Emperor of Germany will announce his determination regarding the San Juan boundary question, which it is understood will be favorable to the United States.
