MAYORALTY BATTLE T. Roosevelt Takes a Hand in Support of Mitchel

New York, Oct. 80 .- New York City has swumg into the last week of the municipal campaign with programs ar-ranged for the four mayoralty candi-dates and their chief supporters that will provide a strenuous wind-up for the most exciting political contest in the history of the city.
