

THE MURDER OF SCOTT.

The Saddest Incident in Last Northwest Rebellion.

REVOLVING CRUELTY OF RIEL.

The unfortunate events transpiring just now in the Northwest, instigated by the machinations of Louis Riel, recall with vivid interest the atrocious massacre of Thomas Scott in the winter of 1870.

This fellow was so drunk, however, that he could not aim, and poor Scott's head, which was struck by the bullet, struck back and forth of the ear, struck the skull, and came out near his right ear, and he was thrust into the coffin and placed in the hearse, in charge of a half-breed sentinel.

THE SOUDAN.

Reported Gradual Withdrawal of British Troops - Wolesey to Return Home - Advance of Graham's Troops.

A last night's London cable says: The news from the Sudan continues to indicate the steady withdrawal of the British troops comprising the Nile expedition. Gen. Lord Wolesey and Gen. Sir Redvers Buller have arrived at Dongola. Gen. Wolesey will leave tomorrow for Cairo, accompanied by Lord Charles Berosford, R.N., the commander of the naval brigade. The general opinion is that both these heroes will arrive at London within a few weeks.

A federation of Liberal associations has decided to actively oppose a continuous war in the Sudan. It is believed the Government is not unwilling to submit to party censure. The opinion prevails that it will be a matter of time before the Government will endeavor to open up negotiations with the Mahdi.

THE RUSSIAN SCARE.

The two suspected dynamites arrested at Quebec have at last been released from custody for the want of proof. They had retained the able services of Mr. C. Fitzpatrick, advocate, but he was not allowed to hold any interview with them. Nothing daunted, he went to work to apply for writs of habeas corpus, and when the authorities saw he intended to show fight, they gave in and allowed the prisoners their liberty. They will probably institute an action for false arrest and imprisonment.

The French Senate has adopted the bill increasing the duty on imported cattle and sheep.

A Paris special says the trade depression in France is terribly severe, and that bread riots are feared in Lyons, Marseilles and Paris.

The changed squadron has arrived at Montreal. Its appearance there was unexpected. The only theory offered is that it is awaiting orders.

Knubley, the Paris reporter who reported the capture of the French general, has been sentenced to two days' imprisonment, and fined 200 francs.

This member of the princely house of Schwarzenberg died on April 6th, 1890, so that he dies on the verge of attaining his 76th birthday. For some time he opposed the infallibility of the Pope, and his history he gave his unreserved adherence to the dogma.
