

THE NORTH RIDING EXHIBITION.

The annual Exhibition of the North Riding Agricultural Society, held at Stratford last week, was in all respects equal to the exhibition of previous years, in some respects considerably better. In the stock department, the Riding Exhibition comes well to the front, and the show of horses, cattle, and sheep on Thursday and Friday last, in quality, if not in number, was certainly the best the society has yet held. It was a stinging show, with so many fine townships lying adjacent to and around Stratford, there should, at least, have been three or four times the number of entries there were. In the five classes of horses the competition was lively, the majority of the animals shown being really first-class. Cattle were only limited in the number of entries, but some very choice herds were on exhibition. Sheep and pigs were also well represented as to quality, and the competition was in general very close. The show of poultry was, as usual, very good, there being between fifty and seventy-five coops of well bred fowls of different varieties. In the hall, taken as a whole, the display was the best we have seen, and in the horticultural and ladies' department, it could scarcely be excelled. There was a good display of garden vegetables and field roots, and the fruit, taking into consideration the unfavorable season, was very fair. Amongst the special features of the show was the attractive and somewhat extensive display of bees and honey, and the necessary apparatus for the management of bees. The floral display was excellent, and the miscellaneous department was not the smallest or least attractive part of the exhibition. About \$500 was taken in at the gate.

Palmerston Fall Show.

The Fall Show held in Palmerston, on Tuesday and Wednesday last, was but poorly attended, and the number of exhibits in all departments was remarkably small. A few good horses, cattle, pens of sheep and pigs were shown, but there was but little competition in any of the classes, except the former.
