Clarence's Remains An American Girl Captures a Live French Duke.

Arbitrators in the Bering Sea Dispute Sexton's Amendment to the Address in Reply to the Queen's Speech.

The Spurgeon Funeral Services. London, Feb. 10.—The first of the three services to be held over the remains of Rev. Mr. Spurgeon to-day opened in the Metro politan Tabernacle. The edifice was crowded. The children from the Stockwell crowded. The children from the Stockwell Orphan Asylum, in which institution Mr. Spurgeon was deeply interested, were present dressed in mourning and sang hymns. The Rev. Mr. Pierson, the American minister, who has occupied the pulpit of the Tabernacle since Mr. Spurgeon's illness, addressed the congregation after the singing by the orphans, and he was followed by a number of other speakers.

Disposal of the Duke's Remains. LONDON, Feb. 10 .- It is understood that one result of the visit of the Prince and one result of the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Osborne is that the Queen consented to allow the coffin of the Duke of Clarence to be removed to Sandringham, where it will be buried in the churchyard in a grave adjoining that of the infant princess who died in 1871. The coffin is to remain in the Albert Memorial Chapel at Windsor until after the return of the court to the castle, as the Queen wishes to see it, and her Majesty will attend the service in the chapel, which will be conducted by the Bishop of Rochester and Canon Bulton. The Queen did not wish the coffin to be placed in the royal vault, but desired to have it buried in a crypt of the Prince Consort's mausoleum at Frogmore. The removal to Sandringham and interment there will be conducted privately.

The largest and best set of apartments in Kensington Palace have now been unoccupied nearly ten years. They were the residence of the Duke of Sussex, the Duchess of Inverness and the Duke and Duchess of Teck in succession. It is understood that the Queen for some time has contemplated having them reconstructed and redecorated in order that they may become the future London residence of Princess Eastrice and Prince Henry of Battenberg.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

The demand for the publications of the Department of Agriculture and for the enlargement of the scope of the Burcau of Industries, evinces a growing desire for fuller information with respect to all matters affecting the interest of the husbandman. Notwithstanding the decreased output of timber and sawlogs last winter, the revenue from woods and forests for the year 1891 was in excess of the estimate. The receipts on account of erown lands sales were also larger than anticipated.

Owing to the exceptional drought in the spring and early part of the summer of last year forest fires were unusually numerous and extensive. By means of the system of fire ranging adopted some years ago these fires were in some instances entirely extinguished at an early stage and in others confined to limited areas. The prompt information conveyed to the Crown Lands Department through this service greatly facilitated the work of the department in dealing with the injured timbers, and about 100,000,000 feet of pix purposes territory through which fires

the department in dealing with the injured timbers, and about 100,000,000 feet of pine in unlicensed territory through which fires had passed were during the latter part of the year disposed of at good prices. A commission has been appointed to re-port upon the desirability of establishing a forest reservation and park in part of the Nipiesing district, south of the River Mat-tawa, and upon the methods and expense of cawa, and upon the methods and expense of maintaining and managing the same.
