Michigan.
Magistrate Parke had the usual accumulation of Saturday and Sunday drunks to deal with at the Police Court this morning. John Goodall, a jolly sailor who had a great cargo of spirits aboard, was allowed his liberty, he having sobered up. He will join his boat at Port Stanley. Goodall was arrested on Saturday, while under the influence of the wine, and was anchored a mile up the Thames, at the turnpike road.

James Collins appeared with his face considerably smashed and with two large cuts on his nose and forehead. "There's no help for you at all, Collins. You must go some place," said the Magistrate. "If you let me go this time, your Honor, I'll be sure to do it. Look at the state you are in. Five dollars or twenty days." Thereupon Collins resumed his seat with the air of a martyr.

Edward Fountain and William Smith stood up on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. "Were you drunk on Saturday night, Fountain?" asked the Magistrate. The Council met on July 16, all the members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and signed. Ordered that G. Durbin be paid \$2 50 for opening a culvert on the Wainfleet road to let the water off the land owned by Mrs. Ling. By-law No. 47 to divide the township into four wards and nine polling divisions was introduced and read a first, second and third time and finally passed. A resolution of the special rates to be collected in schedule of the special rates to be collected in London South to pay debentures issued by the Township of Westminster for drains and sewers was presented by the clerk and approved. Mr. A. G. Chisholm, Mayor, presented a resolution that the amount of \$111 10, which by the terms of the Amalgamation Act the city must collect in London South and repay to the township. Moved by J. H. Little, seconded by J. Durbin, that G. Durbin be given a check for \$136 13, balance in full of ward money due the second ward. Carried. The following sums were paid by order of the council: \$34 85 to Hunt Bros., for wood for charity; \$20 00 for registration first ward election; \$40 to A. G.
