A FRENCHMAN'S SUGGESTIONS.

PARIS, May 29.—Deputy Deloncle, in an article in the Siccle on the Newfoundland Legislature's address to the Queen an impertinen manifesto, to which, he says, Lord Salisbury will send a fitting answer. It proves, however, he continues, the urgent necessity for a solution of the question. If Eggland only had the courage to make the proposals which he recently suggested, namely, to submit the dispute to arbitration, to compensation the French fishermen and to give France some indemnity, such as territory in Africa, in return for her surrender of her diplomatic rights, together with an additional proposal reserving to France the right to buy bait in Newfoundland for the Great Bank fisheries, he overtures would be favorably received in Paris and an amicable settlement would easily be arranged. Only let the two Cabinets open negotiations seriously and the colonial authorities would see that the hour for recrimination had passed, and that it would be to their immediate interest not to hinde the diplomacy of the home Government.
