BUSINESS IN CANADA.

Dun & Co's Weekly Statement—An Op-
timistic Report From Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 25.—R. G. Dun & Co's weekly statement of trade in Canada says:

There is not the activity in trade at Montreal that is generally looked for at this season, and collections generally are reported but indifferent. In the grocery line attention is largely directed to dried fruits, which, in most lines, show a strong tendency to advance. In dry goods, travelers' orders are moderate. Cottons continue to advance, the last notification to the trade advising an increase of 5 to 7 1/2 per cent in the quotations for pillow cottons. Wholesale orders for woolen goods are reported rather freer, and several mills that were closed down are resuming work. For leather there is little improvement in the local demand, but sale is firmer, and the English market for Canadian black leather is better. The cheese market is about on the level of a week ago, with moderate shipments. Butter is a shade firmer. The general quotation for fall money is 41-2 per cent.

There is very little change in the trade situation at Toronto. Dealers report a fair business, and seem satisfied with the outlook. There is a better feeling, with increased confidence in financial circles. The home prices of wheat are encouraging to farmers, and the increased movement of produce is being felt in slightly improved payments. Country merchants are buying cautiously, and stocks of merchandise are not large—a very good feature. Cotton goods are firm in prices, while woollens remain steady. Business in groceries is fairly active. There is a good deal of local competition in sugars, and sales of granulated at 4 cents. Dried fruits firm, and currants in limited supply. Hardware dealers report a fair trade, with little change in prices. New York drafts are selling in Toronto at a premium of \$1 50 per \$1,000 between bankers. Speculation is quiet on the domestic exchange, and prices are as a rule. Bank of Commerce stock is in demand and higher.

Lady Aberdeen Pleasantly Surprises the Tavistock People.

Vice-Royalty Warmly Received at Brantford and Woodstock.

A Very Busy Day for Their Excellencies—They Have Gone East.

Woodstock, Sept. 24.—Two important fairs, those held by Brantford and Woodstock, were visited by Lord and Lady Aberdeen today, and to be present at them their Excellencies traveled from Goderich in the morning, receiving in the course of their journey a charming little demonstration at Tavistock—where, by the way, Lady Aberdeen delighted the German citizens by addressing them in their own tongue. Tonight the Excellencies remain in Port Hope, preparatory to a visit to Lindsay tomorrow. The receptions were uniformly hearty, and everything passed off in the pleasant manner. The weather was perfect; clear and bracing, with just enough of warmth in the autumnal sunshine to make matters comfortable.

Leaving Goderich by 7 a.m., the vice-regal party traveled southeastward along what was formerly the Buffalo and Goderich line towards Brantford via Stratford. The journey was broken at Tavistock by one of the most charming of the many smaller public receptions which their Excellencies received. The school population of the village was on the platform, while the station premises were gay with flags and bunting, and the grounds were filled with spectators. The weather was perfect; clear and bracing, with just enough of warmth in the autumnal sunshine to make matters comfortable.

Lady Aberdeen complied with the request, and, to the huge delight of a very large portion of the audience, delivered a brief address in German. Exceedingly cheerily she gave the cheering of the children as they stepped on the platform, and the cheers were re-echoed when Lady Aberdeen appeared. Two pretty children, Lizzie Ballantyne and Willie Richardson, presented their Excellencies with bouquets, and after the cheering had subsided Lord and Lady Aberdeen spoke in happy little speech. His Excellency observed that there was a strong German element in this section, and that Lady Aberdeen should speak German very well (Applause). He would ask her Excellency to speak to their German fellow-subjects in their own tongue (Applause).

At Brantford, which was reached about 12:20 a.m., the railway station was thronged with people. At the fair grounds an immense crowd had also gathered. The Mohawk cadets acted as a guard of honor, and escorted the party to the elevated platform. As Lord and Lady Aberdeen ascended the steps the choir of 500 children struck up "God Save the Queen." Addresses were then presented to their Excellencies by the City Council, Southern Fair, and the W. C. T. U., and kindred societies. His Excellency made a very happy reply, and then, in the presence of the children, he and his wife, Lady Aberdeen, were taken in charge by the ladies' board of the fair, who entertained her to luncheon. Lady Aberdeen was then driven to the platform, where a very large number of ladies had assembled to hear her address on the "National Council of Women." In plain terms she outlined the objects of the council, and urged that the ladies of Brantford would organize such a society and affiliate with the National Council. At 12:30 Lord and Lady Aberdeen were escorted to the Kerby House by the City Council. Their Excellencies left at 2:30 for Woodstock.

GREETED AT WOODSTOCK.

From Brantford to Woodstock a special train was run, and at Woodstock at 3 o'clock. The vice-regal party were met at the station by a number of leading citizens, and conducted in a four-horse carriage along the principal streets of the town, which were gallantly decorated with bunting and flags. Arrived in front of the grand and fair grounds their Excellencies were presented with two addresses, one from the Town Council, read by Mayor Knight; and the other from the Agricultural Society, which was presented by President M. S. Schell. Lord Aberdeen replied in fitting terms, and afterwards inspected the exhibition. The Countess was presented with bouquets by little Miss Marjory Stewart and Miss Toddle Nellis. The Twenty-Second Battalion, North Oxford Rifles, acted as a guard of honor, and the Governor-General complimented them on their appearance. Five hundred school children sang national airs under Conductor Crooke. The vice-regal party left for the east at 5:15. On the way to the station they visited the Public Hospital.
