End of the Victorian Jubilee

On Saturday the celebration of Queen Victoria's jubilee came to an end with a naval review off Spithead, which was a magnificent demonstration of Great Britain's strength on the sea. Throughout the entire week the display of popular feeling and the intense spirit of loyalty which manifested itself were significant of the deep affection in which Victoria is held by her millions of subjects, and the world was shown that the crown is more securely on her head than at any time since it was first placed there, and that the throne is more stable than at any period of its recorded history.

We in this land know that the reign of Victoria has witnessed the gradual and complete renascence of the political authority at one time vested in the crown of England, that the participation of the people in government is widening each year, that the worker sits in parliament and makes his influence felt, and that while England does not yet rejoice in democracy, all lovers of free institutions must take pride in her development. The works of the distinguished Frenchman, M. Taine, in speaking of England, were never more appropriate than now. He pictured it as a country which "has effected revolutions without committing ravages, which, while reforming in all directions, has destroyed nothing, which has preserved both its dress and its constitution, which has jettisoned off the dead branches without leaving the trunk, which, alone in our days, among all nations, is in the enjoyment, not only of the present, but of the past."

But it was not alone the intellectual and political growth of England that was in evidence; the jubilee was a physical strength and power were also pictured. The soldiers who marched through the streets of London came from the most distant parts of the earth, and their "God Save the Queen" echoed round the world. And then there was the naval review of Saturday. Contrast it with the rotten navy of England in 1616 as described by Pepys—ships rotten, unprovided, and unmanned; the country at the mercy of the Dutch invaders, and men of substance fleeing for London and for the kingdom—and it can be seen what a spectacle it presents of the progress of the world. There are people who are fond of talking of "isolation" of England. With a navy such as that which assembled at Spithead on Saturday, such isolation must be a splendid isolation, and there is little wonder that Englishmen are proud of their heritage. Nor need it be thought that while England is the tradesman and shopkeeper, and holds commerce above chivalry, that she will not fight. Deep down under the smug face of the Londoner there lies the Viking and the soldier, and if he is once crowded into battle he will be as potent as were his forefathers when they followed Plantagenet across the hot sands of Syria, or dashed the world with the splendor of their deeds at Agincourt. The jubilee has shown that this unconquerable spirit still lives.

THE TWO-MINUTE MARK.

[From the Chicago Chronicle.]

Some time during the present season John R. Gentry, king of side-wheelers, will be sent after the two-minute mark. He is not only confident the scheme will be successfully carried out that American trotters and pacers lead the world in records, but he is confident that a sulky having a large screen behind it will be dragged along by a team of six horses, and that the sulky will be able to complete the feat.

The advantage claimed for the screened sulky is that it will cut off the wind, and also, by the formation of a partial vacuum, enable the pacer to travel more rapidly with reduced effort. The idea grows out of the attempts of wheelmen to utilize a similar device to increase the speed of cycling racers. It has been learned that following a tandem or quad is a decided advantage.

The bodies of the pacers shield the racer from the resistance of the air, and he is able to maintain a steady pace. St. Louis effort to follow an engine screened as Gentry's sulky will be a decided test of the scheme.

There is one question involved. The runners will be badly handicapped by the resistance of the screen. Can they, with the difference in records in their favor, pull the screen away as rapidly as Gentry can come up to it? Lewis G. Tewksbury is confident the scheme will prove a success. He says the screen will not reduce the runners' speed twenty seconds. This will give them ample allowance to pull the

tips.
