## The Emperor at the Races.

Soon after the start was made in the race  
for the Queen's cup the Meteor took the  
lead, which she held over the entire course.  
The Corral, however, which crossed the  
finish line second was declared the winner  
on time allowance.

## Fearful Mortality.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Chronicle's St.  
Petersburg correspondent learns that over  
50,000 persons died of cholera in Russia  
during the month of July. These figures do  
not include the deaths from cholera in Asiatic  
Russia.

## Committed for Trial.

PARIS, Aug. 2.—Marquis de Mores and  
the four seconds who assisted at the late  
duel between the Marquis and Capt.  
Mayer, in which the captain was killed,  
have been committed for trial on the charge  
of manslaughter.

## Will Object to Davitt.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The News says that  
the Government will object to Michael  
Davitt taking a seat in the Commons on  
the ground that he has not completed the  
full term of his sentence on a criminal  
charge. Objections on this score, the News  
adds, are invalid, as Davitt's sentence has  
long since expired.

## The Cholera Record.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 2.—It is again re-  
ported that cholera has appeared in Mos-  
cow. The disease has made its appearance  
in Riazan, a town and capital of the Gov-  
ernment of Riazan, 110 miles southeast of  
Moscow. The epidemic is decreasing in  
the Volga districts, but is increasing in the  
Don territory, including the Government  
of Rostov, where 1,055 new cases and 447  
deaths occurred in one day.

## "Changes Are Lightened."

BERLIN, Aug. 2.—Attention is called by  
the press to the rapidity of the changes  
made in the army by the present Emperor.  
Since his accession to the throne eleven  
generals have been retired, namely, Dink-  
lage, Knoke, Schulerberg, Freytag, Hein-  
rich, Hoyer, Heydewitz, Schulerberg,  
Bardleben, Hock and Scherben. The  
Prussian army consequently is now com-  
manded by men as inexperienced as the  
Emperor himself.

## Horse Poisoners Sentenced.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Lambert Barron and  
John Macchattie, who, with two grogms,  
were indicted on Saturday last for conspir-  
ing to defraud foreign marine insurance  
companies by shipping horses to America  
after getting heavy insurances on the  
animals and having them poisoned on the  
voyage, were convicted today. Barron  
and Macchattie were sentenced to one year's  
imprisonment, to pay a fine of \$1,000  
each. The grogms were also convicted and  
sentenced to imprisonment for three  
months.

## The Monetary Systems.

VIENNA, Aug. 2.—The Neue Freie  
Presse today publishes the details of a  
scheme elaborated by Prof. Schuchert to  
harmonize the monetary systems of the  
world. The professor recommends that  
the coming international monetary confer-  
ence agree that no gold coin containing  
less than 23.665 grains of the gold coin be  
allowed to be coined or circulated in  
contracting countries; that silver coins  
of silver to one of gold that silver be legal  
tender up to \$20, and that silver coins be  
below fixed standard of purity be withdrawn  
from circulation. Prof. Schuchert considers  
everything depends upon the attitude  
of Great Britain.

## Ruined by Storms.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Thousands of farmers  
and wine growers in France have been  
ruined by the disastrous effect of recent  
storms. In the Department of Here alone  
the loss amounts to \$800,000.

## Down on the Chancellor.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—The Vossische Zeitung  
today prints an article headed "Away  
with Caprivi," in which it reviews the  
plans of the Chancellor, when it criticizes  
unsparsingly, while praising Bismarck.

## Disaster by the Sirocco.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—A severe sirocco pre-  
vails throughout Algeria. The heat is  
intense, the mercury having reached 110  
degrees Fahrenheit in the shade and 120  
degrees Fahrenheit in the sun. Most of the  
forests are being injured in different parts  
of the country.

## Cholera Closes the Schools.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 3.—In consequence  
of the prevalence of cholera in Russia the  
Minister of Education has ordered that all  
the schools in the country shall remain  
closed until Sept. 1. The course of medical  
lectures in this city will be suspended until  
Nov. 1 in order that students may assist in  
the combating of the disease in the infected  
districts.

## Cholera Terrible Fatal.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—A dispatch from  
Tehran says: The cholera epidemic in  
Persia shows five thousand persons died from  
cholera in Meshed in June and July, being  
30 per cent. of the number of persons at-  
tacked.The cholera has further advanced in Cen-  
tral Russia. Three cities have been re-  
ported at Joliet, a city of about 20,000 in-habitants in the Government of Orela, on  
the Senna Bystaria River.Gen. Booth Goes to Holland.  
LONDON, Aug. 3.—Gen. Booth, com-  
mander-in-chief of the Salvation Army,  
started last night for Holland, where he will  
spend some time touring through the  
country and making speeches in the in-  
terest of the army. He says that the  
criticism of his scheme for the redemption of  
the masses have as yet not accepted defini-  
tely his challenge, one of the conditions  
of which is that the books of the various  
branches of the movement be examined and  
certified to by his followers. He is very  
much gratified by Henry Labouchere's  
solicited testimony that the redemption  
colonies are doing an extensive and useful  
work.

## An Old Estate in Danger.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Lord Henry Augustus  
Bruce, who is a brother and heir to the  
Marquis of Ailesbury, and others interested  
in the preservation of the splendid estate  
known as Savernake Forest, Marlborough,  
Wiltshire, have carried to the House of Lords  
the question whether Savernake Forest  
shall be disposed of to meet the enormous  
debts upon it, and to relieve the present  
Marquis from the burden of indebtedness.  
The judicial tribunals have already decided  
in favor of the sale. Lord Henry Bruce,  
however, has all along been opposed to the  
disposal of the estate, believing that when  
the Marquis and his debts disappear in the  
course of nature there will be no difficulty  
in restoring the glory which used to attach  
to the magnificent seat of the Bruces.The question was argued before the  
House of Lords, and in behalf of the  
sale it was maintained that the trustees  
had sanctioned the sale and the Court of  
Appeal had consented to it. Sir Horace  
Davy appeared for Lord Henry Bruce and  
the other opposing relatives, and the case  
is likely to occupy days in hearing.

## Will Leave Bismarck Alone.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—Gen. Von Caprivi has  
made a bold attempt to destroy Prince  
Bismarck and discredit Count Von Walder-  
see, and to retain the imperial favor. He has  
failed signally, and now, instead of leading  
an attack upon the chief foe, he is en-  
gaged in defending his own position, a  
task which may prove too hard for him.  
When the Emperor returned from Norway  
a bundle of over 300 hostile newspaper  
articles clipped by the Emperor's Majesty  
press, was presented to him by Caprivi.  
These articles were accompanied by an  
elaborate report, which it was hoped would  
convince the Emperor of the malignity and  
injustice of the one to whom the Emperor  
criticisms in the papers were attributed by  
the Chancellor. Gen. Von Caprivi, who was  
laboring under considerable excitement,  
took special pains to direct attention to  
the attacks which were more particu-  
larly aimed at the Emperor. The Emperor  
was advised by the Chancellor to  
have recourse to legal measures and to stop  
the press war. Thanks to the intervention  
of a more temperate counselor, perhaps  
Count Philipp Eulenburg, his Majesty de-  
clined to take Caprivi's advice, and he was  
brought to understand that public opinion  
would not be with him if he went much  
further in his present policy.

## ALONG THE RAILWAY LINES.

George Taylor, general freight agent,  
and A. Busby, general passenger agent, of  
the Intercolonial Railway, have been  
superintending the work of the railway  
agents who are to be their successors.  
G. T. R. return of traffic for the week  
ending July 30, 1892: 1892, passenger train

A train of 40 grain cars of 60,000 pounds  
(1,000 bushels) capacity was recently  
drawn from Chicago to Philadelphia by one  
engine, occupying five days, giving a speed  
of fifteen miles an hour. The distance be-  
tween the two points for changing engines  
has been increasing in this country of late,  
and some western roads are now running  
engines 200 or 300 miles where they formerly  
run only 100 miles or less.KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 3.—The much-  
awaited \$12 Denver cut will go into effect  
today. Passenger agents are doing an  
immense business. In anticipation of a  
great rush on Saturday and Sunday, the  
Burlington and Rock Island roads have  
announced that they will take all freight  
trains of their road on those days, and the  
other roads will probably be forced to do  
the same.

## CANADIAN STEAMER SUNK.

She Goes Down in Five Minutes, but Her  
Passengers Are Saved.Pictou, Ont., Aug. 3.—Last night about  
9 o'clock the steamer Princess Louise was  
sunk in the Bay of Quinte, near Pictou,  
opposite Thompson's Point, seven miles  
east of Pictou, in a collision with the tug  
Rescue. Her twelve or fifteen pas-  
sengers were saved. She met the tug  
Rescue with a tow made up of the steam  
barge Reliance, the tug Puritan and a  
cable boat, all loaded and bound for  
Oswego. Through some misunderstanding  
of signals the tug struck the Louise, cut-  
ting her half through. The steamer com-  
menced to sink immediately and went down  
in five minutes. The tug Rescue took the  
passengers and mails to Deseronto.

## Fast Time on the Atlantic.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The latest trip of  
the steamer Teutonic from Liverpool was  
made in 5 days, 18 hours and 46 minutes.  
Children Left Alone to Starve.PICKERING, Ont., Aug. 3.—The 6-weeks-old  
infant son of Samuel Figler, of this city,  
was found dead in his crib this morning.  
An autopsy showed that death had resulted  
from starvation. The parents of the child  
absented themselves two days, leaving four  
children to care for themselves. The other  
three children were nearly famished when  
found. The parents are the victims of drink.

## Dog and Snake Fight.

LANCASTER, Ky., Aug. 3.—Col. Fletcher  
Owsey was fishing yesterday in Dick's  
River, some miles distant, in a locality  
noted for snakes, when his big Newfoundland  
dog attacked a nine-foot snake, catch-  
ing it by the middle and shaking it vigor-  
ously. The serpent managed to coil around  
the dog's head and trunk. A desperate fight,  
lasting an hour, followed. At last the  
snake sank its fangs in the dog's throat  
and killed him, but it succumbed in the  
struggle, dying almost immediately. Col.  
Owsey attempted to kill the snake, but  
hit the dog as often as the reptile. He  
brought the serpent to town, and will have  
it mounted.

## BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

What Will Happen When the  
New House Meets.All Parts of the Kingdom To Be Repre-  
sented in the Liberal Ministry.THE TEST MOTION.  
LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Times says the  
division in the House of Commons on the  
address in reply to the speech from the  
throne will possibly occur on Tuesday  
next. It has been reported that the speech  
from the throne shall be read on Monday.  
The amendment to the address will be  
moved from the back Opposition benches.  
After the case of the Government is stated  
Mr. Gladstone will speak, and no one in  
the front Opposition benches will take  
part in the debate. As the Government  
does not desire to prolong the discussion,  
it will be for the Parliament to determine  
whether the debate shall continue beyond  
the second night.

## POLITICAL EXCITEMENT.

Great political activity is noticeable in  
London now. Around Pall Mall and Car-  
lton House terrace scores of prominent  
Liberal hovers, coming and going. Mr.  
Gladstone's headquarters being the center  
of attraction. Mr. Gladstone receives fre-  
quent visits from John Morley, Sir William  
Harcourt, Lord Rosebery, Earl Spencer and  
others of his immediate political circle,  
with whom he earnestly discusses the  
formation of the new Government and its  
initial steps in legislation. The Reform  
and National Liberal Clubs are meanwhile  
the rendezvous of the rank and file of the  
party, and here groups of well-known  
workers can constantly be seen discussing  
the situation, chiefly in speculation as to  
the make-up of the Cabinet.

## COMING APPOINTMENTS.

A prominent Liberal said this evening  
that Mr. Gladstone has made up his mind  
to announce certain appointments which  
will be sure to cause excitement. He has  
long felt it unfair that Englishmen should  
absorb all the offices, and he would  
prefer to have representatives of all parts  
of the kingdom in the Ministry. He has,  
therefore, according to the informant, de-  
cided to apportion a few offices to the  
Irish leaders. Arthur O'Connor will be  
appointed a post as Civil Lord of the Admiralty,  
and Mr. Sexton will receive the appoint-  
ment of Irish Secretary. But these  
gentlemen will not be made members of the  
Cabinet, and Mr. Gladstone does not care to  
irritate the Queen too much, lest she ex-  
ercise her privilege of refusing to receive  
members of the Cabinet whose appointment  
is not agreeable to her.

## GLADSTONE BETTER.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Mr. Gladstone is much  
improved today.

## WILL OPPOSE MORLEY.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Mr. Joseph Cowen, of  
Newcastle, denies that he has agreed to op-

## ST. CLAIR FLATS.

Their Position as a Factor in the Re-  
sulting War.DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 3.—Secretary A.  
Thompson, of the Chamber of Commerce,  
an authority on the subject, in an interview  
on Canadian retaliation in the matter of the  
St. Clair Flats Canal, which they claim is  
in Canadian territory, said:"The Canadian claim that the entire  
canal runs through Canadian waters and  
territories cannot be upheld for a moment.  
In the first place Great Britain conceded  
exclusive ownership, control and jurisdic-  
tion of the canal to the United States by the  
treaty of Washington, ratified in 1871.  
On Sept. 4, 1888, resolutions passed the  
Senate requesting the Secretary of War to  
report whether channels in ordinary use in  
Detroit and St. Clair Rivers, including St.  
Clair Flats Canal, were in waters under  
jurisdiction of the United States, or the  
Dominion of Canada. Under date of Nov.  
14, 1888, the Secretary of War made a  
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
