The Electric Street Railway.

The finance committee of the council talked over electric street railway matters with the Electric company last evening, when an agreement drafted by the city solicitor came up for discussion. The company will make a further proposition regarding the time paid on the different lines, the kind of poles to be used, keeping the snow off the streets in winter, plan of single and double tracks and the extensions. Ald. Parnell fought stubbornly to have a line run south on Wetley road from Bruce to Bruden, and the company will likely submit. Transfers will be run from 6:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., and the company will extend their lines if public needs require it or the council so direct. Those present were Ald. Meale (chairman), Parnell, James Fitzgerald, and Currothers, Mayor Eversy, City Solicitor W. R. Meredith, Mr. T. H. Smallman, Manager S. R. Break, and Solicitors Holmuth and Levy.
