Passenger Tariff War Declared in the West.

Eastern and Southern Lines Are Also

Affected. Chicago, Aug. 6.-A passenger rate war that will affect directly every fare in the west, and indirectly half of the tariffs of eastern and southern lines, has been declared. Next Monday the rate between Chicago and St. Paul and Minneapolis will be \$8. The tariff now is \$11 50. On the same day and thereafter until peace is declared the rate between Chicago and Omaha will be \$9 25. The normal rate is \$12 75.
