At Springbank.

The Street Railway Will Try to
Keep People in Town.By Offering Inducements at Spring-
bank on Monday.

Commutation Tickets at a Ten-Cent Fare

—Pretty Views from the Hill. Fire-
works Reflected in the River.The street railway company will in-
augurate a new era at Springbank on
Monday, and London's beautiful resort
will be formally opened in a most aus-
picious manner. Already thousands of
citizens have signified their intention
of remaining in town and patronizing
the home resort, and it is altogether
likely that the cheap fares on the
different railways will bring many out-
siders to town, who will also avail
themselves of the opportunity of visit-
ing Springbank. Persons who have
traveled far and wide acknowledge
that the view from Springbank hill is
alone worth several times the price
of a trip or a visit to London to see
the south of the reservoir of Dela-
ware. This scenic view is the most
pleasant scene of quiet pas-
toral beauty, of fields under cultiva-
tion, and snug farmhouses. To the east
the city rises, another hill, four miles
away, and on a clear day the steeples
of the various churches, prominent
buildings and landmarks can be easily
discerned. Then there is the glow
of the sun, and the hazy smoke over
the city, that seems to emphasize the
fact that the onlooker is free from both
for a few hours at least. Between the
city and Springbank, the river winds
in and out, the trains enter the city by
way of the Cove, and the Pipe Line
road stretches its sinuous way over
hill and dale. Immediately beneath
the hill are the collecting ponds of the
waterworks, the broad expanse of river
which will shortly be dotted with boats
and small river craft, the dam, and the
pumping houses, with their wealth of
hydraulics and steam machinery, open
at all times for the inspection of the
public.But the most charming of the many
pretty views at Springbank is that ob-
tained from the west side of the house
at the southwest corner of the reser-
voir. To the left are the heavily
wooded hills in the direction of Dela-
ware, rising one above the other, un-
till they become lost to sight in the
blue distance. At your feet the river
glides sluggishly, until it is lost in
the distance. A dam checks it. A new
bridge spans the gorge just below
the mill, and the spot is a favorite
resort of fishermen. Across the river
the view extends beyond the line of the
Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific
Railways, and trains can be seen leav-
ing the station at Hyde Park. The farm-
lands between have the appearance of
one large checker-board, the different
crops under cultivation giving differ-
ent colors to the squares, and altogeth-
er the scene is one such as an artist
would delight in, and the lover of
nature grow rapturous over.And when darkness comes on the
street railway company have ar-
ranged an attraction which cannot
fail to draw thousands. Over \$500
have been expended on fireworks,
which arrived yesterday from Prof.
Hand's factory at Hamilton. These
will be set off across the river, in
front of the hotel, and can be seen
from any portion of the ground, the
shelving nature of which makes a
ladder up the side of the big
chimney will have its colored light.
Scattered over the grounds will be a
number of three hundred candle pow-
er incandescent lights, the globes of
which are every bit as large as the
moon. It is the intention of the
company shortly to put an immen-
se search light on the hill, which will
be seen for many miles around.The cards advertising the attraction
of Monday have this announcement:
"Water will be furnished by the
commissioners free."

ling Springbank water on the
grounds and the, to some preferable,
sulphur spring water.The line has been extended several
hundred feet further west than
at first intended, and the loop is big
enough to accommodate several wait-
ing trains. A small station will be
built at the extreme end, which will
leave passengers in lovely meadow-
land away beyond the trees of the
park.The ties near the park are being
planked, so as to prevent accidents.
The cars have been equipped with a
new fender, and a woven wire pro-
tection at one side. Two steps have
also been placed on all the motor
cars.The company has decided to issue
25 commutation tickets for \$2.50, mak-
ing the return fare only 10 cents.
The tickets must be used within a
month. In agreeing to accept ordi-
nary tickets the company also add a
great convenience for the public.
Workingmen's tickets are accepted in
the proper hours, making the round
trip fare only 12 and a fraction cents
between the hours of 6:30 and 8 a.m.,
and 5 to 6:30 p.m. (Green tickets, 7
for a quarter, are also accepted.)
Although the road will open with

mencement.
