Miss MacFarlan regained her balance and started for the little pantry just south of the dining room, and closed the door.

VICTIM PRAYS FOR MERCY. Mrs. Youngs dragged the door open and advanced upon the girl, who fell upon her knees, begging to be spared. MacFarlan, learned of his daughter's death upon his arrival at Indianapolis, thrusting the knife into her breast, and, waiting a moment to exclaim that she had avenged the loss of her husband's love, left the house. Last Obstacle in the Way of Negotiations Removed.

TITLE TROUBLE CLEARED AWAY

Will Take Ten or Fifteen Years to Dig the Panama Canal Ditch-Cost About \$40,000,000.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 20 .- Practically the last obstacle to the completion of negotiations for the Panama Canal route has now been removed. If all goes well the President will be able to incorporate in his message to Congress week after next a positive statement to the effect that the United States is now in position where it can go ahead and begin actual operations on the interoceanic canal.

The Minister of Colombia, who took has received from his Government a sharp reminder that it is his principal business to secure a canal treaty, and that he is not expected to concern himself at all with the domestic affairs of the home government. The result is that Secretary Hay and Minister Concha have reached the basis of an agreement, and the treaty will probaby be signed before Congress meets.

If not, a protocol or basis of agreement will be signed which will take the place of a treaty for the time being.

FIFTEEN YEARS' WORK. It is estimated, by those in a position to know, that it will take somewhere in the neighborhood of ten or fifteen years to build the big ditch. Some people have imagined that the United States had only to take up the cutting where the French left off, and continue the work until the canal was completed. Engineers who have gone over the ground say, however, that the French did not leave off anywhere in particular, and that, in fact, they have done but little but accomplish a preliminary working survey of the canal route. Other sections of the work, however, were honestly surveyed, and, taken altogether, it is believed that the operations of the French company will on the whole result in the building of the canal.

SOMETHING TO GO BY. When the working canal commission finally gets together there is every reason to believe that the Chicago Drainage Canal will be made the basis of all future operations. The Panama cut, of course, will involve the expenditure of four or five times as much money, and the work will proceed on a much larger scale, but it is now understood that the first shipment of ma-chinery to the isthmus will all be of the same general type as that used so it upon himself to delay negotiations, successfully to divert the waters of has received from his Government a Lake Michigan toward the Mississippi River. The engineers who have been over the Panama construction say that much of the machinery in use there now will have to be abandoned, and it will also be necessary to organize entirely new methods of work.

This will necessitate elaborate new surveys and a close inspection of the entire route not only by the engineers, but by prospective contractors as well. This will take possibly several years, because a large part of the route is real-
