

CARRIE CREATES SCENE AT SHOW

A Lively Time in the Madison Square Garden.

VANDERBILT PEOPLE ABUSED

Mrs. Nation Advises Them to Take Off Their "Disgraceful Clothes"—Had To Be Ejected.

New York, Nov. 21.—Mrs. Carrie Nation broke loose at the horse show yesterday afternoon. She harangued the multitude on the evils of overeating, attempted to break a bottle of champagne and finally was ejected from the building by the police.

Mrs. Nation entered the garden quietly and took a seat in the tier. She had been there only a few minutes when her gaze rested on the box where some of the Vanderbilt family were sitting. She studied the programme and then descended to the promenade. Stationing herself in front of the Vanderbilt box, she delivered a tirade on overeating.

In the box were seated Mrs. Alfred G. Vanderbilt, Reginald Vanderbilt and Miss Nelson. Young Vanderbilt was leaning against the rail of the promenade and did not see Mrs. Na-

tion approach. "You ought to be ashamed of yourselves," she screamed at them. "You ought to be ashamed to wear such disgraceful clothes. Take them off. Take them off at once, and attire yourselves more modestly."

Alfred G. Vanderbilt hastily left his position at the rail and came over to where Mrs. Nation was standing, wiping her forehead with a handkerchief. He whispered something in her ear and pushed her away. The outburst of the woman attracted a great crowd of people and the business of the Vanderbilt box were evidently much embarrassed.

SEIZED A BOTTLE OF WINE. Mrs. Nation then turned her attention to other boxes. Finally she started to the cafe, where she tore down on a party of gentlemen who were drinking wine. Mrs. Nation seized the bottle and glaring at the men, shouted: "You men, don't drink such filthy stuff. You're going straight to hell. Where is the man who sells this damnable stuff? Show him to me and I will tell him what I think of him."

Mrs. Nation's request was speedily granted by the sudden appearance of M. Villeneuve, the caterer at the garden.

"Get out of this horrible business," she shouted at him. "You are on the verge of hell, ruining the bodies and souls of men. You are drinking with you. Shame on you! Shame on you!"

Mr. Villeneuve, however, pounced upon Mrs. Nation and rescued the bottle, which she had repeatedly brandished in the air, to emphasize her remarks. The police forced her out of the building.

ROCHESTER'S LATEST TRAGEDY

Inquest Begun in the Case of Florence MacFarlan.

FURTHER DETAILS OF MURDER

Victim Invited Her Slayer into the Parlor—Man's Picture Found on the Body.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 20.—The coroner's inquest on the death of Miss Florence K. MacFarlan, who was stabbed to death Tuesday morning by Mrs. F. E. Youngs, was begun today at the public morgue.

James MacFarlan, father of Florence MacFarlan, learned of his daughter's death upon his arrival at Indianapolis, Ind., today. MacFarlan, who is a traveling man, said his daughter and Frank Youngs had been infatuated for some time and that he had warned the latter to cease his attentions to Miss MacFarlan. Mr. MacFarlan was preparing to telegraph his daughter a birthday present when the news of her death was broken to him. He declared Mrs. Youngs and his daughter had been intimate friends, but denied that the latter was a music teacher.

VICTIM WAS SOUGHT OUT. It appears that Miss MacFarlan, the murdered girl, was sought out by the jealous wife, Mrs. F. E. Youngs. The victim fled before her assailant, who stabbed her in the breast and arms. The fatal thrust penetrated the woman's heart. To her parents Mrs. Youngs confessed the crime, but declared she did not know how badly her victim was injured. Her intention, she said, was not to kill but to maim.

THE HUSBAND. Frank E. Youngs, the husband of the woman under arrest, is a well-known man in Rochester. He has been engaged in the camera business, and was once city purchasing agent. The clew which led to the arrest was obtained through a picture of

Youngs and his two bulldogs, which are as well known as his is.

A note in the handwriting was found on the dresser at their home. It read:

"Frank: May God forgive you for all the trouble you have caused me. 'LULU.'"

Miss MacFarlan was rooming in the family of Mrs. Louis Savoy, but boarding elsewhere. When Mrs. Youngs called, Miss MacFarlan invited her in, and they sat in the little parlor in the front of the house. No loud words were used, or, in fact, anything done to lead Mrs. St. Louis, the cook, to suspect anything.

THE ATTACK.

Suddenly Miss MacFarlan rushed out of the parlor and toward the dining room, which is just off the hallway. Mrs. Youngs was close behind her. A blow already had been struck. Miss MacFarlan stumbled and fell against the dining room table, and blood spurted over her white linen cloth.

Miss MacFarlan regained her balance and started for the little pantry just south of the dining room, and closed the door.

VICTIM PRAYS FOR MERCY. Mrs. Youngs dragged the door open and advanced upon the girl, who fell upon her knees, begging to be spared. The woman again attacked her, thrusting the knife into her breast, and waiting a moment to exclaim that she had avenged the loss of her husband's love, left the house. She was arrested two hours later at the home of her father.

The body of Miss MacFarlan was found lying where Mrs. Youngs had left her. A cut about six inches in length had laid bare her left arm near the shoulder. It had been running from the left of the median line, was a small "Y" wound which had penetrated the heart. On the right shoulder near the end of the arm, was another wound.

MAN'S PICTURE ON THE BODY. A gold locket with the initials "F. K. M." was hanging from a slender gold chain on her neck. A picture on the inside was identified as that of Youngs.

CAN GO AHEAD ON GREAT CANAL

Last Obstacle in the Way of Negotiations Removed.

TITLE TROUBLE CLEARED AWAY

Will Take Ten or Fifteen Years to Dig the Panama Canal Ditch—Cost About \$40,000,000.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 20.—Practically the last obstacle to the completion of negotiations for the Panama Canal route has now been removed. If all goes well the President will be able to incorporate in his message to Congress week after next a positive statement to the effect that the United States is now in position where it can go ahead and begin actual operations on the Inter-oceanic canal.

The Minister of Colombia, who took it upon himself to delay negotiations, has received from his Government a sharp reminder that it is his principal business to secure a canal treaty, and that he is not expected to concern himself at all with the domestic affairs of the home government. The result is that Secretary Hay and Minister Concha have reached the basis of an agreement, and the treaty will probably be signed before Congress meets.

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SHOT BY HUNTERS.

He leaves two boys and three girls, and was a devoted hunter.

but, according to the best reports obtainable, the machinery used is largely of American type. The methods have been distinctly French. It is the opinion of many engineers that practically all of the work supposed to have been done by the French Government will have to be done over again.

COST \$40,000,000.

It is said that the \$40,000,000 which the United States is to pay will be a very heavy burden on the country. It will secure for the country a vast amount of engineering data which it would otherwise take years to accumulate. The work is being systematically laid out by its original promoters. Other sections of the work, however, were honestly surveyed, and, taken altogether, it is believed that the operations of the French company will on the whole result in the building of the canal.

SOMETHING TO GO BY.

When the working canal commission finally gets together there is every reason to believe that the Chicago Drainage Canal will be made the basis of all future operations. The Panama canal, of course, will involve the expenditure of four or five times as much money, and the work will proceed on a much larger scale, but it is now understood that the first shipment of machinery to the isthmus will all be of the same general type as that used so successfully to divert the waters of Lake Michigan toward the Mississippi River. The engineers who have been over the Panama construction say that much of the machinery in use there now will have to be abandoned, and it will also be necessary to organize entirely new methods of work.

NEW SURVEYS.

It is not deemed probable that the line laid down by the French engineers will be adhered to. On the contrary, it is already known that the route can be profitably varied. This will necessitate elaborate new surveys and a close inspection of the entire route, not only by the engineers, but by prospective contractors as well. This will take possibly several years, because a large part of the route is really through already known territory, though it is paralleled by the railroad. This question of rental has been satisfactorily adjusted at last, and the Colombian Government has agreed to a strip of country from ocean to ocean to the United States. Political sovereignty will be retained in Colombia, but the United States will have daily as much control of the property as a tenant in this country is given under a 99-year lease.

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
