A SERIOUS SITUATION REPORTED ON THE NILE

Belgian Posts Attacked by Rebel Natives.

Strong Protest Against Tax on Broadstuffs.

Three French Fishing Vessels Sunk by a Gale on the North Sea—Many Men Perished—Earl Spencer to Lead the Liberal Peers.

Brussels, April 30.—The Vingtième Siècle reports a serious situation on the Nile. Several Belgian posts have been attacked by rebel natives from Uganda, says the paper, and British troops have established themselves on Belgian territory.

Difficulties have arisen between the Belgians and the British in the Lado enclave. A fresh revolt has also broken out in the Upper Ubanghi River, French Congo.

London, April 30.—At a meeting of the Liberal peers yesterday afternoon, Earl Spencer was selected to succeed the late Earl of Kimberley as Liberal leader in the House of Lords.

PROTEST FROM FLOUR IMPORTERS.

London, April 30.—An influential delegation representing the flour importers of most of the large cities of the United Kingdom, had an interview with the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, this morning, to protest against the taxation of flour, which, the delegates said, would seriously affect the extent of their trade.

The chancellor, in replying, pointed out that the deputation represented solely wheat flour, and that it was impossible to consider the grain and meal duties separately from that viewpoint. It was impracticable, in imposing duties on grain, to differentiate between grains.

The imports of flour compared with the imports of wheat had grown enormously in recent years, and he did not think it was to the benefit of the people of the country. He had reduced the duty on officials, so that the four importers were no better off than under the late Mr. Gladstone's tax, and he doubted whether they were entitled to further advantages.

TIMELY DOWNPOUR.

Lord Curzon of Kedleston telegraphs that heavy rain, hail and rain have fallen in Bengal and the Assam, and there have been local showers in Burmah and parts of Madras. The prices of grain are generally stationary.

MILITARY CHANGES IN INDIA.

A dispatch from Simla to the London Times says Lord Curzon is carrying out the policy of substituting militia for regulars at advanced posts on the northwest frontier province, and concentrating the military strength at a few points.

The construction of a railway from Khushalgarh, on the Indus, to Thal, at the entrance of Kuram Valley, has made possible the withdrawal of regulars from Kuram, leaving local militia under British officers to guard the valley.

WILHELMINA IMPROVES.

The Hague, April 30.—The morning bulletin issued from Castle Loos regarding the condition of Queen Wilhelmina says she passed a quiet night and that the feverish periods were more frequent.

Both chambers of the States General, on receipt of today's bulletin from Castle Loos, charged their presidents to convey to the queen an expression of sympathy.

BILL TO ABOLISH STRIKES ON CANADIAN RAILWAYS

Compulsory Arbitration of Labor Disputes.

Mr. Mulock Introduces an Important Measure.

Dominion and Provincial Boards to Settle Troubles—Applies to Electric and Steam Roads.

Ottawa, April 29.—Mr. Mulock introduced in the house this afternoon a bill for the settlement of railway labor disputes. The measure applies to all steam and electric railways, including the Intercolonial Railway. The bill makes strikes and lockouts illegal and punishable, and provides for compulsory arbitration. The conciliation boards are Provincial and Dominion.

Provincial boards will deal with the railways situated in each province, and those railways operating in more than one province. It provides for seven provincial boards, each consisting of three members. One member is to be chosen by the railway company, one by the employees and the third by the two members, or, if they do not agree, by the governor-in-council.

The Dominion board is to be composed of five members, two elected by the seven representatives of the railway owners on the provincial boards, two by the seven employees, representatives on the provincial boards, and the fifth by the other four or by the gov-

CAPTURE OF GEN. GONZALES.

Caracas, Venezuela, April 30.—Gen. Gonzales, president of the district of Cumana, was made a prisoner during the fighting of April 23, near San Antonio, when the government troops sustained a bad defeat, and General Castillo was mortally wounded.

The revolutionists are marching on the city of Cumana. A panic prevails at Carapana and Barcelona.

CABLE NOTES.

United States Consul-General Osborne, aged 60 years, died at his residence in Wimbledon on Tuesday. William McKinley Osborne was appointed consul-general at London by President McKinley on March 18, 1897. He was a cousin of the late President McKinley.

MANY LIVES LOST.

Dunkirk, France, April 29.—Advices received here say that the French fishing fleet was recently caught in a gale in the North Sea, that three schooners foundered, and that many lives were lost.

KING MAY PARDON AMERICAN OFFICERS

But They Are Likely to Have a Month in Prison.

Rome, April 30.—The American officers imprisoned for disorderly conduct at Venice may be pardoned by King Victor Emmanuel.

Another dispatch says: The officers of the United States cruiser Chicago, who were arrested at Venice, remain in prison there. An application for their discharge has been rejected. The Italian law does not allow the court to grant pardon in cases of assaults on the police.

Some of the newspapers mention the lynchings of Italians in the United States as sufficient reason for a refusal of royal clemency. It is considered probable, however, that the prisoners will be released by order of the king, June 1, the date of the fete of the constitution.

It seems that American officers have never been arrested and condemned abroad except years ago, in Brazil, when an officer shot a deserter. Through the good offices of Washington, Dom Pedro released him.

The question now is whether the officers may be allowed to ask pardon of the king, or whether the request must go through the embassy.

The cruiser will sail on Friday for Trieste.

Washington, April 30.—Secretary Long has received the following cablegram from Captain Dayton of the Chicago, dated Venice yesterday, in answer to the department's inquiry: "Doddridge, Wynne, Leadbetter, Kears, and one marine on leave arrested.
