A. Jackson, B.A., of Toronto, general secretary of the Ontario Sunday School Association. Rev. A. J. MacGillivray was in the chair, and the remarks of the two speakers were listen-ed to with the greatest attention and Mr. Jackson said the best way to get at the efficiency of a Sunday school wa to compare the average attendance wit the number of pupils on the roll, thought that it was very necessary

the teachers to take a practical interest in their scholars, and keep track of the absentees, either by writing to them or by paying them a call during the week. The speaker also recommended that the scholars be systematically trained in contributing to the various church funds Another interesting point made by the speaker was that the Sunday school made as homelike as possible It had, he thought, to enter successfully into competition with the theaters and similar institutions.

Mrs. Bryner spoke principally with regard to the methods of teaching, and made many very helpful, practical suggestions. These were grouped under the following heads: Read all the lessons; chalk up the names of the books of the Bible from which the lessons are taken; state the characters to be studied; the location of the lessens given; the various periods covered; the repetition of the thoughts dealt with, and questions from the Golden Text.

Both of the speakers were tendered hearty votes of thanks by the gathering.



Of \$462,640 on the Roll for 1904 All But \$39,000 Has Been Turned in Already.

A statement prepared by Major Hayes, London's efficient tax collector. gives some interesting facts regarding the taxes collected in this city. It shows that the city council of 1904 had nearly \$112,000 more money to spend than had the city council of 1896, when Mr. J. W. Little was mayor. In 1896the year before Mr. Hayes was appointed—the taxes collected amounted to but \$351,137, whereas the taxes this year total over \$462,000.

Major Hayes reports the collections of taxes this year as very satisfactory.
