TOOK FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE OATH; RECEIVED GOLD BADGES

Graduate Nurses of Victoria Hospital Rewarded for Long and Faithful Services.

The graduating exercises of the Victoria Hospital Training School for Nurses took place at the Auditorium, yesterday afternoon, in the presence of a large and fashionable audience. The platform was beautifully decorated with ferns and palms. Besides the graduating class about 25 nurses-in-training were on the platform, together with Mayor Campbell, the Bishop of Huron, Superintendent Heard, Hospital Trustees Scruton, Matthews and Lattin, Dr. John D. Wilson, and others. Mayor Campbell occupied the chair. While the audience was gathering, Tony Cortese's original harp played several beautiful selections. Prayer was offered by the Bishop of Huron, and Miss Isabel Scarlett sang a beautiful solo, entitled, "Spring Has Come." She sang splendidly, and deserved the hearty applause accorded her.

Dr. John D. Wilson delivered the first address. He apologized for the absence of Hon. Adam Beck, who was prevented from attending the exercises. Dr. Wilson paid many compliments to Dr. Beck's untiring efforts for Victoria Hospital. He paid tribute also to the zeal of former boards of trustees, and mentioned the name of the late Mr. Isaac Waterman, who shortened his days in working for the hospital. He then gave a history of the hospital enterprise in London, from the time of the old hospital on York street with its five or six rooms, to the new grand structure with its great accommodation. In 1897 there were 542 patients and the revenue was \$4,299; in 1904 there were 1,320 patients and the revenue of \$18,872. Dr. Wilson was sorry that the Government had not increased the grant, which was distributed over too much ground. He found fault with the Government's grant of \$200,000 for a hospital in connection with the University of Toronto, in addition to the grant to the university proper. All were proud of the work being done by the Western University. He mentioned the name of the late Mr. MacGill, Eva Lovina Bond, Miriam Sharpe, Lizzie Thom, Ethel M. Fraser, Jessie Kenward Smith, Isabel J. Hutchinson, Edythe C. Fredin, Annie Burnett Wall and Frances Vera Whitting. After this ceremony each nurse was presented with a magnificent bouquet.

Miss Isabel Hutchinson read a clever valedictory, in which she gave a history of the class, its ups and downs, its losses by death, and the many things that entered into their probationary career.

Mayor Campbell, in a short but witty address, completed the programme. He wanted to give them the word of service, and encouragement. Graduation was but a step; their real life was before them. Nursing had formerly been a servitude; it was now a profession. It was not to render a minimum of service for a maximum of pay. The nurses were to keep their pledge in mind. They must at all hazards preserve the ethics of the profession. He advised them to render faithful service, to be kind, to be cheerful always, and above all to be discreet. He wished the graduates all prosperity.

the old and the new was shown in the alleviation of suffering. He paid a warm tribute to the mother of nursing—Miss Florence Nightingale, who gave herself without money and without price for humanity's sake. Hers was the expression of the Christian spirit. Nursing had become a profession since then. It was not necessarily worse, but on the contrary might be a great deal better. One aim and object produces better results. Anna's tears are not the best. Specialists do best work always. Bishop Williams warned the graduates against doing their work professionally for the sake of it, but always to keep in mind the glory of God. The professional in that sense does so much and no more; the man of God will never cease to do. He also warned them of the danger of withdrawing their services from the poor, the lower classes, as they were called. He disliked the latter expression. A mechanic, a clergyman, a doctor, a nurse—all were equal in the sight of God, if faithful to their trust. There should be no trades unionism among nurses. Trades unions were necessary to fight corporations. They were not necessary among nurses. He outlined a scheme whereby wealthy men might interest themselves in the poor by hiring a nurse or several of them to work among the poorer classes. He congratulated the graduating class and wished them every success.

One of the most solemn parts of the programme was the taking of the Florence Nightingale pledge, by the graduates. The pledge is as follows: "I solemnly pledge myself before God and in the presence of this assembly, to devote my life in purity and to practice my profession faithfully. I will abstain from whatever is deleterious and mischievous, and will not take or knowingly administer any harmful drug."

"I will do all in my power to maintain and elevate the standard of my profession, and will hold in confidence all personal matters committed to my keeping, and all family affairs coming to my knowledge in the practice of my calling."

"With loyalty will I endeavor to aid the physician in his work and devote myself to the welfare of those committed to my care."

DEPORTATION OF MARQUETTE OFFICIALS CAUSES AGITATION

Americans Do Not Like Outcome of Move Made by Mr. Hyman in Workingmen's Interests.

The decision of the Dominion Government to deport a dozen or more Pere Marquette officials who were brought in to replace Canadians on the road, continues to agitate some of the newspapers across the line, and from many cause threats of retaliation if the decision is enforced.

The investigation of the charges of discrimination preferred against the Pere Marquette officials, and the institution of Mr. Hyman, and it revealed the fact that numbers of competent Canadian railway men were given their walking tickets by the Pere Marquette to make room for others from the United States. The evidence was secured by Mr. Joseph T. Marks, editor of the Industrial Banner, the investigation was conducted by Judge Winchester, and the latter's report was such that the department of labor did not hesitate to order the deportation of the Americans, allowing the company sufficient time, however, to fill their places. The move of Mr. Hyman was in the interests of Canadian workmen in general, and railroads in particular, who now feel that it will bring about the degree of competition that is intended by the alien labor law. Now that the move of Mr. Hyman is in the States are raising a cry, forgetting that every day of the week at the border towns American officials are busy turning back Canadians whom they suspect are going to the United States to work, and are also subjecting them to all kinds of petty annoyances. One Detroit daily states that 2,000 Windsorites find daily employment in Detroit, but the Windsor Record investigated the matter and it found that not one-tenth of that number of Windsor's population work in Detroit. Moreover, it makes the statement that the checker of the Canadian side of the Detroit River exceeds the number of Windsorites working daily in Detroit and living under the Union Jack. The Record even has the assurance that the highest-price officials in the following industries are persons living in Detroit:

She was afterwards taken over on the Wabash and landed at the Wabash station. Her friends had to wait at the Brush street station to meet her.

Two Scotchmen were going to Essex. They had their tickets via G. T. R. to Windsor, and their baggage transferred to the M. C. R.
