JABEZ BALFOUR FREE

Magnate Who Swindled to Extent of \$30,000,000 Serves His Term.

London, April 14-Jabez Spencer Balfour, formerly a financial magnate and a member of parliament, who was sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment in 1895, for extensive frauds in connection with the Lands Allotment Company, and the House and Land Investment Trust of the Liberator group of companies, was released today from the Parkhurst Prison on the Isle of Wight. It is said that he probably will return to the Argentine Republic from eral condition of the vilayets (districts) where he was extradited before his trial, and where it is said that he holds considerable interests in different trade concerns.

The case of Jabez Balfour caused a good deal of interest. He is a man of good education and pleasant manners, and succeeded in swindling thousands of people, especially persons belonging to the poor middleclass of England. It was estimated that these lost about \$30,000,000.

> The British consul at Salonica quoted a "typical instance," which involves the at-tempt of the authorities to discover the murderers of a Mussulman landowner's steward. After the murder the local officials appear on the scene, and, assisted by the undisciplined soldiery, endeavor, by beat-

ing and torture, to extract from the villagers the names of the assassins. Then follow the "procureur," with his abortive judicial inquiry, and the doctor, whose medicines had not been delivered to the sufferers three weeks after the event." Sir Nicholas O'Connor, the British ambassador at Constantinople, holds the insurgent bands mainly responsible for crimes committed between Jan. 1 and Aug. 27, 1905.
