### NEW MUSIC ASSOCIATION IS LAUNCHED IN LONDOI

Canadian Teachers Convene at Conservatory and Establish Musical Society.

"The Canadian Music Teachers' Association" came into being yesterday as a result of the convention of the Western Ontario musicians held at the London Conservatory of Music yesterday. In urging the formation of an association similar to the Canadian Guild of Organists, Prof. Norman Andrews stated: "It has been estimated that there are about ninety thousand students of music in the Province of Ontario alone. This enormous number shows an almost universal interest in the study of music, and in spite of this momentous fact we are at present the only profession without organization. A Contrast.

"Let us ask ourselves a couple of questions as to what benefits we as teachers of music may expect through organization. Will organization assist the public to distinguish between the qualified and unqualified teacher? At present the public are continually being imposed upon by persons teaching music without any qualification. Unfortunately the cheap fee attracts attention, but in reality the cheap fee is by far the most expensive. cheap fee is by far the most expensive. If the public had some means of knowing the qualified from the unqualified, they would gladly pay a higher fee for a guarantee of qualification, and this could certainly be accomplished by organiza-
