MYSTERY IN DEATH  
OF NURSE AT GALT

Inquest Ordered by Coroner  
After Brief Investigation—  
Ill Only a Few Hours.

Galt, April 13.—Mystery surrounds the death of Mrs. C. Dempsey, of Galt, who died last evening at the farm of Robert Jamieson, Roseville road, after an illness of only a few hours.

Mrs. Dempsey for some time past has been engaged in nursing and had been attending a patient at Mr. Jamieson's home.

An inquest was ordered at once by Coroner Dr. Radford and the jury after viewing the body this afternoon adjourned until Wednesday. An autopsy was performed tonight by Drs. Vardon and Dakin.

May Have Made Mistake.  
Inquiry at the home of Mr. Jamieson disclosed that methylated spirits were used and it is supposed that the nurse had taken some by mistake.

NEW MUSIC ASSOCIATION  
IS LAUNCHED IN LONDON

Canadian Teachers Convene at  
Conservatory and Establish  
Musical Society.

"The Canadian Music Teachers' Association" came into being yesterday as a result of the convention of the Western Ontario musicians held at the London Conservatory of Music yesterday. In urging the formation of an association similar to the Canadian Guild of Organists, Prof. Norman Andrews stated: "It has been estimated that there are about ninety thousand students of music in the Province of Ontario alone. This enormous number shows an almost universal interest in the study of music, and in spite of this momentous fact we are at present the only profession without organization."

A Contrast.  
"Let us ask ourselves a couple of questions as to what benefits we as teachers of music may expect through organization. Will organization assist the public to distinguish between the qualified and unqualified teacher? At present the public are continually being imposed upon by persons teaching without any qualification. Unfortunately the cheap fee attracts attention, but in reality the cheap fee is by far the most expensive. If the public had some means of knowing the qualified from the unqualified, they would gladly pay a higher fee for a guarantee of qualification, and this could certainly be accomplished by organization."

"The teachers' training course and examination provided by the Western University is exceptionally good, and its teachers' diploma is a splendid guarantee and protection to the qualified teachers and public alike," Mr. Andrews asserted in conclusion.

Appointment Committee.  
F. L. Willgoose, F. C. Thomas and Prof. Andrews were appointed a committee to go into the details of organization, and to take such steps as they deemed necessary to successfully launch the new association.

Frederick C. Thomas gave several excellent hints on fingering, being assisted by a number of members of the conservatory to illustrate the work of the various grades. The numbers were: Miss Mildred Chandler, "Gavotte" (Greg); Miss Norma Dickson, "Minuet in G" (Bach); Miss Evelyn Hayman, "Albumblatt" (Wieland); Miss Ruth Robinson, "Liedeswälder, op. 57, No. 2" (Mozart); Miss Mary Steele, "Kamennol Ostrow" (Rubenstein).

Elements of Melody.  
Miss Geraldine Binder rendered the first movement of Grieg's Concerto in A minor, op. 18, with the orchestral accompaniment played upon a second piano by Miss Steele.

Mr. Willgoose spoke briefly on the elements of melody as applied to the subject of phrasing, and Mr. Andrews gave a short address on music.

At the evening session Prof. Andrews offered an illustrated lecture on "Wagner," pupils of the conservatory, giving a view to showing the development of the composer's genius. Miss Margery Talbot, offered "Elizabeth's Prayer" from "Tannhäuser," an excellent effect, and Grant Milligan rendered the "Prelude from the same opera, on the violin. Miss Steele and Mrs. Vining essayed the rather difficult task of rendering "The Ride of the Valkyries" in piano duo.
