Bond Dealer Gives Some Facts Regarding Saskatchewan Financing. TORONTO, June 24.—W. L. McKinnon of the Bond Dealers' Association returns today to the argument with Hon. George Langley, minister of municipal affairs in Saskatchewan, about the alleged impairment of bond scurity through municipal extravagance and the lack of proper governmental supervision. To the minister's statement that money had not been spent foolishly, Mr. McKinon cites a number of cases, as follows, declaring at the same time that he is giving his personal views:

"The town of Humboldt defaulted on the interest of its bonds in 1916. The extravagance on its electric light service was appalling. It showed a deficit of \$16,720 for the ten months ending October, 31, 1919, or three years after the town defaulted on its bonds. What did the Government of Saskatchewan do to stop this extravagance? Why was it not stopped before the default took place in the year 1916? The town of Humboldt default is still not cleared up.



## The town of Humboldt default is still not cleared up. Four Times Too Large. "What about Battleford? This town of 1,100 population has a debenture debt of \$487,000, over \$440 per capita. This is more than four times what it ought to be. This debt is to a great extent the result of foolishness in the spending of money on public buildings and utilities. "What about Sutherland? This town has spent over \$100 per head for sewers alone. Just think of a town of 925 people spending \$95,000 on sewers, yet Mr. Langley says I do not speak the truth when I charge that Saskatchewan towns have been unbellevably foolish in spending money on capital accounts. A Huge Deficit. The town of Humboldt has spent \$156,395 for waterworks and sewerage. There were only 40 consumers who connected with the mains in 1919. The total revenue from the Humboldt waterworks system for the first ten months of 1919 was \$1.795.59. The total expenditure was \$29,538.29. leaving a deficit of \$27,742.68 for the ten months. But why multiply cases? "The municipalities in Saskatchewan are on the average very sound indeed financially. The Saskatchewan Government has failed to keep some of its municipalities out of trouble. "Under all these circumstances it is unreasonable to ask the Government to aid the weak municipalities and then take no steps to see that the rest of them do not again become financially involved."
