### G. T. R. ARBITRATION EVIDENCE COMPLETE

7,000 Pages of Testimony and 500 Exhibits Made.

MONTREAL, June 24.—After sixty-three days of sessions the taking of evidence in the Grand Trunk arbitration came to a conclusion this afternoon. The board adjourned until Monday. It is possible, however, that counsel for the Grand Trunk may ask the opportunity to bring in some further evidence in rebuttal of that adduced by the Government counsel. The board is anxious to hear argument without delay, but it was reported today that counsel would ask for time to study the 7,000 pages of evidence and 500 exhibits. The work before the board today was of a mopping-up character.

At the afternoon session A. W. Atwater, K.C., counsel for the Grand Trunk, while cross-examining D. E. Brown, expert railway accountant, brought up the question of the reserve, which has been so much under discussion.

"What reserve do you refer to?" asked the witness.

"The sea serpent probably," interjected Sir Thomas White.

Mr. Atwater said a matter of \$5,000,000 was called an inside reserve.

"Or a midnight reserve," suggested Mr. Butler.

Mr. Brown, the witness, said this was a reserve against operating expenses, which could be used to reduce these accounts.

### RANEY WITHDRAWS CUBAN REFERENCES

Matter Was Taken Up With Premier by Acting Consul.

TORONTO, June 24.—Attorney-General W. E. Raney has withdrawn his references to Cuba, made in an address to the Lawyers' Association of the London Methodist conference, against race track gambling, which references were objected to by Charles Armstrong, acting consul for Cuba. The withdrawal has been made through Premier E. C. Drury, to whom the acting consul protested.

"I have drawn the matter to the attention of the attorney-general," says Premier Drury in his letter to the acting consul. "He is glad to have your assurance that conditions in Cuba do not justify the comparison, and assures me that he has no desire to do an injustice to your country. He, therefore, withdraws his reference to the Republic of Cuba."

"Under all these circumstances it is unreasonable to ask the Government to aid the weak municipalities, and then take no steps to see that the rest of them do not again become financially involved."
